THE BUNTON FAMILY

Based on Material on Bunton Family given by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Patterson Bunton

The Bunton (Buntine-Bunting-Buntin-Buntyn-Bunton etc) family was well established in Virginia prior to 1700, with later generations moving to the South and Westward.

This family appears to have been well-to-do from early times and of the homes built by the early settlers to Texas several nice two story residents are still standing, including the home of John Wheeler Bunton, the signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

In 1832 four members of the Bunton family came to Texas from Sumner County, Tennessee. They were:

1. John Wheeler Bunton, 6 ft. 4 inches tall
2. Robert Bunton, ancestor of President Lyndon Baines Johnson
3. Lucius Bunton
4. Desha Bunton, 7 feet high

All were over 6 ft. and known as "The Four Giants"

Desha Bunton's home was located where the Insane Asylum main building is now located in Austin, Texas. It was said that he could call a man down on the capitol grounds and be heard distinctly. (Did not need a telephone).

In 1853 James Madison Bunton, a younger brother, and the mother of the above listed men, came to Texas. She was Mrs. Phoebe (Desha) Bunton. Mrs. Bunton was a relative of Governor Desha of Kentucky. Another relative, Miss Mary Desha, of Washington, D. C., helped organize the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution in 1891. (1891)

John Wheeler Bunton (named for a Revolutionary War Ancestor---Miss Brewye went to DAR on John Wheeler's Rev. War Record---in 1901, she also joined DRT in 1901) was a college graduate and Lawyer and after remaining in Texas five years he returned home and married in 1837, Miss Howell. A younger relative, Miss Varina Howell (1828-1907) married as his second wife, Jefferson Davis---their home is one of the historic houses in Natchez, Mississippi. Jefferson Davis' first wife was the daughter of Gen. Zachary Taylor and they met while Jefferson Davis was under command of Gen. Taylor at Fort Jessup, La. She died within 3 months after their marriage, and Davis remained a widow for 10 yrs. Marrying Miss Howell in 1845. Both Mrs. Bunton and Mrs. Davis were related to Governor Howell of New Jersey (Governor Richard Howell).

The last grandchild of the signer of Texas Declaration of Independence, John Wheeler Bunton, died January 1, 1964. He was Robert Bunton of Hays County, Texas, lived out from San Marcus, Texas.

John Wheeler Bunton and wife are buried in the State Cemetery. Their remains were moved there in 1930's from the Robinson Graveyard in Hayes County, near Buda, Texas.

own account. At his shop the horses that drew the stage to the Black Hills of South Dakota were shod. He conducted business under a partnership relation, the firm name of Elliott & Hynds being assumed. This connection was continued until 1886 and Mr. Hynds then turned his attention to various other business interests, being so engaged from 1886 until 1910. He became actively interested in mining and has been connected with the development of the mineral resources of the state for many years. He has ever watched his opportunities for judicious investment and has at all times improved his chances in that connection. Lately he has become extensively interested in the development of the oil fields and his investments have brought to him a notable measure of success. In 1910 he organized hotel interests under the name of the Plains Hotel Company but of the business he is sole owner. He leases the building which he occupies, but the furnishings are his and he is conducting one of the best hotels in Cheyenne. He also built the Capital Grill and he is now erecting a five-story steel and concrete fireproof structure for store and office purposes at the corner of West Lincoln highway and Capital avenue, its advantageous location insuring him a ready rental of the property.

On the 11th of April, 1901, Mr. Hynds was married to Miss Nell McGuire. Mr. Hynds greatly enjoys hunting and fishing. His religious faith is that of the Catholic church. He is an honorary life member of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks. He has membership in the Industrial Club of Cheyenne and is interested in all of its plans and purposes for the advancement of the city's interests. His political allegiance is given to the republican party. With many questions of public importance he is thoroughly familiar and he has been actively identified with the good roads movement, having served as president of the Laramie County Good Roads Association in 1913 and 1914. He has held numerous appointments whereby he has represented Wyoming in national conventions and he is ever alert to the opportunities for upbuilding the state, for extending its trade relations, for advancing its natural resources and for upholding those interests and activities which have made Wyoming a great commonwealth, equal in its opportunities and advantages to the older states of the Union.

DANIEL C. BUNTIN.

Daniel C. Buntin occupies a prominent position on the stage of business activity in Laramie, where he is well known as president of the Laramie Water Company. He was born in Nashville, Tennessee, in 1875 and was educated in private schools and in a university of the south, while for a time he was also a student in Vanderbilt University, from which he was graduated in 1899 with the LL. B. degree. Liberal educational advantages thus qualified him for life's practical and responsible duties. He has been a resident of Laramie since 1908 and through the intervening period has been closely identified with development projects and with the work of upbuilding, throughout this section of the state. Realizing the opportunities of the country and the possibilities for men of enterprise, he has become a factor in work that has contributed much to the material development of the state. He was the builder of the James Lake irrigation system, which was executed at a cost of a half million dollars. He colonized that district and sold land to the value of about one and a half million dollars. Again the call of opportunity was to him the call to action and he became the promoter of the Laramie Water Company, concentrating his efforts upon the building of its plant, which work was carried through at a cost of two million dollars. He also has twenty thousand acres of land on which he is extensively engaged in the raising of sheep, cattle and other live stock. He became the vice president of the Tallmadge-Buntin Land Company, which was organized for the purpose of conducting a general land and immigration business—to deal in large and small tracts of alfalfa, wheat, corn, cotton, timber, sugar beets, fruit and general farm and ranch land. In other words, to

conduct a general wholesale and retail land and immigration business in the south and in the west. This company opened its offices in the Railway Exchange building of Chicago and from that point conducted its interests. To his work in this connection Mr. Buntin brought broad experience. He was the vice president of the First Savings Bank & Trust Company of Nashville, Tennessee, and general manager of the Realty Company, also of Nashville. The latter is a stock company that owned, and promoted West Nashville, which has grown to be a city of large proportions, in which are located twenty-nine mills and factories, employing five thousand men. He promoted many other projects in Nashville and in the south, including the building of the great Arcade store and office building, which was erected at a cost of a half million dollars. Mr. Buntin personally owns and controls a large interest in that building and is a stockholder in many of the banks in Nashville and other business projects there. He became the associate of E. R. Tallmadge and others in promoting the railroad from Canyon City, Texas, to Plainview, Texas, and now controls all town-sites along that line. He has extensive holdings and large interests in the southwest and is considered one of the successful young financiers of the country. Turning his attention to Laramie, he recognized its possibilities and his efforts in this connection have been equally effective and valuably resultant.

On the 12th of June, 1901, Mr. Buntin was united in marriage in Nashville, Tennessee, to Miss Elsie Caldwell, a native of that city and a daughter of James E. and Mary W. Caldwell. Her father is the president of the Fourth-First National Bank of Nashville. Mr. and Mrs. Buntin have two children: Thomas Craighead, who was born in Nashville, March 15, 1902; and May Winston Caldwell, who was born in Nashville in 1914. The parents hold membership in the First Presbyterian church of Nashville.

Mr. Buntin is a member of the Chamber of Commerce of Laramie and he is identified with various social organizations and clubs throughout the country. He belongs to the Chicago Athletic Club; to the Hermitage, of Nashville, of which he was formerly president; to the Nashville Golf & Country Club and to the Noelton Golf & Country Club of Nashville, of which he was formerly vice president. Well descended and well bred, he is a gentleman whom it is a pleasure to meet, for he has the happy faculty of placing anyone at ease who enters into conversation with him. He is a man of splendid judgment, quick action, remarkable executive ability, and in all things is actuated by a spirit of determination that knows no such word as fail, for he recognizes the fact that when one avenue of opportunity seems closed he can carve out other paths that will reach the desired goal. His efforts, important and extensive in proportions, have constituted a most effective force in promoting development and progress in various sections of the country, for he has in marked degree all of those qualities which characterize the far-sighted financier and the clear-headed executive.

OLE MOSSBERG.

Ole Mossberg, who is filling the office of sheriff of Sheridan county was born in Sweden on the 12th of August, 1867, and is a son of Olaf and Carolina (Johnson) Mossberg, who were natives of the same country. The father is now deceased but the mother is living and yet makes her home in Sweden. They had a family of ten children, seven of whom are still living.

Ole Mossberg, whose name introduces this review, spent the days of his boyhood and youth in Sweden and is indebted to its educational system for the advantages which he received in that connection. He came to America in 1889, when a young man of twenty-two years, believing that he might have better opportunities to win a fortune on this side of the Atlantic. He first settled in Iowa but resided in that state for only a brief period and in the fall of 1890 removed to Omaha, Nebraska, where he resided until 1893. In the latter year

ANDREW BRISCOE

ANDREW BRISCOE was one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence. He was born Nov. 25, 1810 in ADAMS COUNTY, Mississippi. He came to Texas in 1831. In 1834 he was a merchant at Anahuac. He moved the next year to Harrisburg and from there was a member of the Convention at Old Washington. He first married ELIZABETH HOUSE, perhaps in Mississippi and after her death he married Mary Jane Harris, daughter of JOHN Richardson Harris, August 17, 1837. His father in law was the original proprietor of the town of Harrisburg. Briscoe County, Texas was named for him. He had children:

JOHN W. HUNTON

JOHN W. HUNTON was one of the signers of the Declaration of Texas Independence. He was born in Sumner Co., Tennessee, in 1807, son of ROBERT and PHOEBE HUNTON. He came to Texas and settled at San Felipe in Austin's Colony in 1833, later moving to the town of Mina (Bastrop). He represented Mina District in the Convention, and later served in the first Legislature of Texas, from Bastrop County. In 1837 he married MARY HOWELL, a daughter of JOHN HOWELL in Sumner Co., Tennessee; he also represented Austin County in the Third Congress, but died in Hays County in 1879. He left children:

JOHN S. D. BYROM

JOHN SMITH DAVENPORT BYROM was one of the signers of the Declaration of Texas Independence in 1836. He was a native of HANCOCK COUNTY, GEORGIA,

son of HENRY BYROM and his wife Catherine. He married March 17th, 1818, NANCY FITZPATRICK, of GREENE COUNTY, GEORGIA, who was born there October 2, 1804. He moved from there to Heard County, Ga., thence to Florida. He and Nancy were divorced, and she died at the home of her brother JACKSON FITZPATRICK in Gordon County, in 1877. He then married second MARY ANNE KNOTT and they came to Texas in 1830 and located in Austin's Colony in Brazoria County. By his first marriage Byrom had children:

 3. WILLIAM HARDWICK BYROM
- By his second marriage he had:

MATHEW CALDWELL

MATHEW CALDWELL was born in Kentucky, March 8, 1798 and came to Texas from Missouri in 1831. He and JOHN FISHER were elected the delegates from the municipality of Gonzales to the Convention at Washington and both were signers of the Declaration of Independence. He was afterwards elected or named Captain of a company of Rangers for the defense of GOLIAD; he was wounded at the Council House Fight in 1840 and was in command of a company at Plum Creek August 12, 1840. He died at Gonzales December 28, 1842, and was given a military funeral.

According to the Historian, Thrall, the County of CALDWELL was named in his honor, although the Act fails to state this to be a fact. The State of Texas in 1930 erected a monument at his grave in Gonzales County.

Captain Mathew Caldwell was married in WASHINGTON COUNTY, Texas, May 17, 1837 (or March 16th, 1838, according to the record) to Mrs. H. Morrison. After her death he married, second, Mrs. L. Lawley. Children:

3. CURTIS CALDWELL died young.

Bastrop was Laid off for a Mexican Town

The grant of four leagues of land for the town of Bastrop on June 8th, 1832 by the Supreme Government, carried with it the plans on which the municipality was to be erected, and plainly implies that the idea in mind was that BASTROP was to be constructed after the manner of all Spanish towns. A fair idea of what was intended may be gained by a visit to Matamoris, Juarez, Monterey, or any of the old Mexican towns laid off even before Bastrop was established. For instance, the proclamation provided that the town of Bastrop should have:

What was to be called the Central Square, measuring 120 varas on each side, "Square of the Constitution".

The block immediately East of the Square to be set aside for the Church (Catholic, of course) and the Priests' houses.

The block on the West to be used for the Municipal buildings of the town.

The block to the Northwest for the Slaughter House.

The block on the North to be used for the site of the jail and House of Correction.

The block lying Southwest of the Square and South of the Municipal buildings, to be used for schools and other buildings for public education.

The block at the extreme edge of the town on the Northeast side to be used for the cemetery.

The streets were to run from North to South and from East to West and to be twenty VARAS in width, as shown by the plan of the town accompanying the grant, as made by the surveyor.

Can you not read these "specifications" and easily visualize the kind of town Bastrop might have been, but for the results of Sam Houston's army and the Texas Revolution?

But the kind of people who settled at Bastrop and in the "Little Colony" of Stephen F. Austin, of which it was planned BASTROP SHOULD BE THE CAPITAL, were neither of the "Adobe" or "Hacienda" type. As the late and distinguished JUDGE ROBERT LYNN BATTS declared in a memorial address on the life and services of his friend, Hiram Morgan Garwood, before the Texas Bar Association, as late as 1930:

"Among the first settlers at Bastrop were planters from the older Southern States. They came with their slaves, and in the fertile valley carved out great plantations from the forests along the banks of the Colorado. Under the laws of Coahuila and Texas, a village was laid out; schools and churches were established, and while the Indians were still contesting possession of the soil, a center of culture, developed along the lines of life in the old Southern communities, grew up on the border of the untamed land."

I do not imagine that men like Edward Burleson, Lehman Barker, Reuben Hornsby, Josiah and Mathias Wilbarger, Joe and Jim Manor, Thomas Mays, J. W. Bunton; Jim, John, Russell and Samuel Craft, Jake Barrell, Nathan and Thomas Moore, Sam Wolfenbarger and men of that type, who built the town, followed "specifications" very close.

JOHN W. BUNTON

JOHN W. BUNTON who was born in Sumner County, Tennessee, in 1807 lived in Bastrop a long time, but finally moved to Hays County, at a place called MOUNTAIN CITY, at or near the present town of KYLE. The Burlesons also lived in that neighborhood, and Albert Burleson may have been born there.

BUNTON belonged to Captain ROBERT M. COLEMAN'S company of rangers, called the "Mina" or "Bastrop" Volunteers. He participated in what is called the "storming of Bexar" in 1835, but at that time had been transferred to a Company in command of Capt. John York. He and THOMAS J. GAZLEY and Captain Coleman were elected to represent "Mina Municipality" in the Constitutional Convention at Washington in 1836, and all were "signers" of the Declaration of Independence of Texas. He left the Convention and came home and almost immediately rejoined the army by becoming a member of Capt. Jesse Billingsley's company, also called the "Mina Volunteers", and participated in the battle of San Jacinto. After coming to Texas he returned to his old home in Sumner County, Tennessee, and married his choice for a wife, Miss Mary Howell, and brought her back to Texas to live, though they got captured by the Mexican Navy and imprisoned for a short time at Matamoros. Having obtained some land in Austin County, he lived there for a short time, but in 1840 returned to Bastrop to make it his home. He lived on Cedar Creek until he moved to Hays County in 1857. He died there in the month of August, 1879 and was buried with his wife at Mountain City. Later their remains were removed to the State Cemetery at Austin. When a young man he was a lawyer; graduated from college in Kentucky and at his death left a number of children, all of whom used the name Howell (their mother's maiden name) as a middle name:

THOMAS JEFFERSON GAZLEY

THOMAS JEFFERSON GAZLEY was born in the State of New York, but came to Texas, lived in Bastrop County, and represented it in the Convention that wrote the Declaration of Independence, and signed his name to it as one of the delegates duly elected from Bastrop County. The delegates elected from Mina Municipality were Thomas J. Rabb, Thomas Jefferson Gazley and John W. Bunton. As Rabb did not attend the convention, Capt. Robert M. Coleman took his place, as he had received the next highest vote. Other candidates for these places were JOHN CALDWELL, who received 29 votes, Edward Burleson 27 votes, Robert M. Williamson 25 votes and D. C. Barrett, 5 votes. (L. W. Kemp's "Signers of the Declaration of Independence" p. 137.)

THOMAS J. GAZLEY was a practicing physician, and one of those who offered their services to Colonel John H. Moore for the new Texas Army at Gonzales, in October 1835. After the revolution Dr. Gazley located in Houston for several years, but finally returned to Bastrop Co. and settled near Smithville, where he died in 1853. His wife survived him for several years and resided with her son in Waco. His remains were taken up from their burial place at Smithville some years ago and re-interred at the State Cemetery in Austin.

A creek which runs near and through a part of the town of Smithville, is called Gazley Creek, in perpetuation of the name of Dr. Gazley.

JAMES S. LESTER

JAMES S. LESTER was a member of the Senate from Bastrop and Gonzales in the Congress of the Republic for two terms; was born in Virginia in 1799; located in Bastrop (Mina) in 1834; was recruiting agent at Bastrop for the garrison at San Antonio; fought at the battle of San Jacinto. After Fayette County was organized he appears to have resided in Fayette, and from that time on lived principally in Fayette Co. rather than Bastrop, well-to-do.

Is Just Another Main Street Texas Town

In spite of the elaborate Spanish plans supplied the settlers of Bastrop, these old pioneers of Austin's Little Colony just went ahead and built another plain old Texas town with the usual "Main Street" setting for its business "hub"; set the courthouse at a near-by convenient place, put a Methodist, a Baptist and a Cumberland Presbyterian Church, wherever they found a good and suitable spot for them, which would suit most of their members, whether it conformed to the Spanish specifications or not. As a young lady who was teaching a school in the town long afterwards, wrote her friend in 1850:

"I will pass over the rest of my journey, at the end of which I was pretty stiff and give you some account of BASTROP. The town was very extensively laid out, but like a half starved cat, it is not filled out yet. MAIN STREET, or the back bone of the place, contains eight stores! One of them is built of brick. The houses are of various sizes and shapes. The Colorado is a beautiful stream here, it is closely wooded on its shores; then the land rises into small round hills covered with various colored flowers."

A Few Early Activities in Bastrop

The town commissioners in 1834 voted to give every "artist" who might settle in Bastrop two free building lots. The first beneficiary of this resolution appears to have been S. V. R. Eggleston, who was later killed in the yard of his own home. This is the only intimation found anywhere indicating that Eggleston was an "artist" and there is no enlightenment on what kind of an artist he may have been.

In 1835 Samuel Wolfenbarger was President of the "Ayuntamiento" (Board of Commissioners, or Town Council, I presume). J. W. Bunton was the Secretary, and T. W. Mays was the "surveyor".

The first Methodist Church (said to have been the first of any kind) was organized in Bastrop in 1835, in an unfinished store building which belonged to Jesse Holderman.

S. V. R. Eggleston, mentioned above, built a two-room, two-story frame house in the Southern part of the town. It is said, among other things to have been used as a courthouse, as well as a meeting house and dance hall. This was in the early days of the colony, and in the up-stairs room, on one occasion, people who had taken up lands and married by the common law methods (by contract) gathered in this house to have a visiting priest marry them according to the rites of the Catholic church, even when sometimes they had one of more children. Here is an example of the often quoted saying: "According to an old Spanish Custom". These people, under the law, were already married, but this "Santa Anna" marriage was to appease the Imperial Government" at Saltillo, or wherever it was.

The "BASTROP STEAM MILL CO." was incorporated in 1838 by the Congress of the Republic. JAKE HIGGINS and ABNER COOK ran a saw mill in Bastrop in 1840 to 1844, as did R. H. Grimes, a son of JESSE GRIMES, of Grimes County. Samuel W. Sims and E. L. Smith also built a saw and grist mill on Bastrop's "four-league" grant. Major Brooks built the old Wilbarger home in Bastrop, and also owned a saw mill.

The lumber industry of Bastrop was extensive, and trains of wagons drawn by oxen, distributed it far and wide over the country.
