





Seriously, my Lord, is the good opi-
nion of the world worth enjoying upon
conditions like these? In my opinion,
it is not; and if honour is something
that must be gratified at the expence ei-
ther of justice or humanity, I am con-
vinced that it is not very honourable.—
We all acknowledge the propriety of this
reasoning, yet we all continue the abject
slaves to a custom we detest. What a
glory would it, therefore, be to your
Lordship, whose character for personal
bravery is so thoroughly established, if
you associate with a few sensible young
men of quality, to rescue us from a ty-
ranny so barbarous! You owe your
country much for risking so valuable a
life as your own, and this would be an
exalted method of discharging the obliga-
tion.

I know, my lord, that many elegant
writers are apprehensive, that if duelling
was once abolished, a custom additional-
ly dangerous would be immediately ad-
opted in its room. The judicious au-
thor, particularly, who has obliged the
world with the principles of penal law,
asks, in his chapter upon duelling—
“Whether it is not to be feared, that the
propensity to revenge would substitute
the more fatal, & the more odious prac-
tice of assassination? For my part, I think
not; and for the very reason which he
himself assigns to shew the inefficacy of
declaiming against duelling. “ Of little
avail, (says he), is it to the object, that
true honour depends not on the preju-
dices of the people, but hath its source
in the heart; that it is more courageous
to submit the absurd tyranny of custom,
than to submit to it; that the defence of
honour is not placed in occasional ap-
peals to the sword and pistol, but in a
life of integrity and virtue; that when
a fencing school is made the court of just-
ice, there is no law, no argument but
murder.—All these assertions (concludes
our author) may be true; but the most
solid reasoning is received as mere decla-
mation, when opposed to the impetuosity
of passion, or the fear of shame.”—

When shame (says he, in another
place) is the consequence of obedience
to law, the sword of justice loses its im-
rors.—Indeed the duelist kills his friend
whom he loves, and the judge condemns
the duelist while he scarcely knows how
in his heart to disapprove his behaviour.”
Surely, my Lord, if shame is so very ir-
resistible as to force us into duelling, it
would be equally powerful to keep us
from assassination; if shame is necessary
to make us seek for honourable repara-
tion, it would certainly be sufficient to
save us from the infamy of dastardly re-
venge.—It would unquestionably be as ef-
ficacious on the side of law, prudence &
humanity, as upon the side of injustice,
absurdity, and blood; nothing therefore,
my Lord, is wanting but a generous affi-
ction among a few young men of rank,
to root out the custom of duelling. If
such an association was once established,
and if the members of it made it public-
ly known that they would never admit
any man into their company, who either
made, or attempted to commit an offence he
had witnessed, or required the life of a fel-

referred the petition of James Trost of Johnston
County praying that a Loan of one thousand
dollars be made to him, for the term of two
years on an Interest of six per cent per annum.
Report. That they are of opinion it
would be good policy, to make the loan on
the terms proposed, and for that purpose
recommend the adoption of the following reso-
lution:

Resolved, that the public Tre-
asurer be, and his is hereby required to loan
to James Trost of Johnston County, out of the
Public Treasury, the sum of one thousand dol-
lars for the term of two years at six per cent
interest, on the said James Trost's giving Bond
with good and sufficient security for the
sum, of which security the Treasurer him-
self shall be the judge.



HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

This book was prepared only because it was needed. Genealogists searching for Tennessee origins are frequently stymied because they do not know in which counties to look. Great grandfather "came from Tennessee," but if he ever left a record of where in Tennessee, it has long been obliterated, or at best misplaced. His illiteracy didn't help matters--sometimes there never was a written record of his origins.

With this volume, plus its companions for Middle and West Tennessee (to be published at a later date) the genealogist can, in a matter of minutes, spot the exact counties where further searches should be conducted.

A note of caution. These schedules were transcribed from the microfilm copies of the original census schedules, which were prepared in longhand by the census marshals in 1830. The transcriber is not always certain of the letters in those proper names; vowels particularly are hard to make out. What looks like an "a" may well be a "u" or "o", and "e" and "i" often look alike. Among capital letters it is often easy to confuse "I" and "J", and "S", "T", and "L", to name a few. In addition, the spelling of names was quite fluid, particularly with the widespread illiteracy, so that many people probably could not tell the marshall how their names should be spelled.

The researcher, therefore, should seek out all conceivable alternate spellings when using this book. In addition, wherever possible, he should examine the microfilm himself, for what is printed here may in some cases be incorrect. Since we lack the resources of a Bell Telephone system, it stands to reason that this volume, with almost 31,000 entries, will be less accurate than a telephone directory, for there just has not been time for the laborious checking and re-checking needed to eliminate all possible mistakes.

The first portion of the volume contains, in sequence, copies of the schedules, county by county and page by page. The 24 counties are arranged alphabetically. Six pages of schedules appear on each page here, one column for each page. The number of the page (corresponding to the number on the microfilm) is at the top of the column, and above it in the center of the sheet is the name of the county.

Each entry consists of two lines--name of the head of the family with number of individuals by sex and age group directly beneath it. Each digit represents an age group, the ones to the left of the hyphen (-) being males and those to the right being females. Age groups at this census were: under 5, 5-10, 10-15, 15-20, 20-30, 30-40 and so forth by ten year groupings up to the "over 100" category. Examples follow.

The first entry, in Anderson County, page 167 of the microfilm, reads

Dickson, William
000101-10001

meaning William Dickson's household consisted of 1 male 15-20 and 1 male 30-40, 1 female under 5 and 1 female 20-30.

This entry 0-0130002 means a household with no males, 1 female 5-10, 3 females 10-15, and 2 females 40-50.

Immediately below the name appears a series of numbers. The figures indicate composition of the family by age and sex. Each digit stands for a number in the column on the original schedule (zeros omitted after the last number inserted).

Columns on the schedules are, in order, males 0-5 years, males 5-10, males 10-15, males 15-20, males 20-30, males 30-40, and so on, each succeeding column representing a 10 year age group; the last column before the hyphen is for males over 100. To the right of the hyphen are 13 identical columns for females.
