SAMUEL LAFAYETTE RAWLINS

A sketch of Samuel Lafayette Rawlins, born 17 July 1854 in Draper, Ut. When 9 years his parents went to Sanpete in 1863. They went from here to Richmond in 1865 and in 1871 went to Lewiston to make a home for them all. Here he grew up and his brother Harvey M. Jr. homesteaded the land the boys helped to work it. So he gave his brother Sam and Frank 40 acres apiece and here he had a home when he married Elizabeth Van Orden the 16 Feb. 1880. They moved to Star Valley Wyo. They had a very nice home but not contented, he left and went to Canada in 1895. While there he was councilor to the Bishop in the ward where he lived.

He also contracted a very bad case of Rheumatism -- was so bad he could not stand to be touched. They turned in bed with sheets. He was not able to get in and out of the wagon when they left They stayed 2 years up there then came down into Montana and spent a year. Then to Ora, Idaho, then to Taylor, Idaho, then came down to Cornish, Utah, then over to Preston, Idaho. In the fall of 1908 he for Baulster Peterson and lived on one of his In 1910 he came back to Lewiston, Utah, built a small house just south of his fathers home. They sold him 5 acres of land. stayed there for a while. Then his wife's father was alone and he gave them his home if they would come and live with him and take care of him till he died. So they did live there until Aunt Elizabeth died on the 31 March 1917. He then sold his home and went to Bancroft, Idaho to live with his children that lived up there. He spent some of his time in Lewiston with his brothers and sisters as he was very miserable. He was in Bancroft, Idaho where he died the 29 Oct. 1923. Funeral services were conducted at the First Ward Church house at Lewiston, Utah. Bishop A. William Hyer Singing by the choir, "Mid Scenes of Confusion." conducted. Prayer, Samuel F. Wiser, song by choir "Wanted on the Other Side". Speakers; Peter E. VanOrden, J.J Stewart of Logan, a vocal duet by Rachel Harrison and Effie Villett, "That Beautiful Land". Speakers were Brigham A. Hendricks William Waddoups, and closing remarks by A. William Hyer. The choir sang "The Resurrection Day. Prayer by J. H. Stocks.

I was born and grew up in Auburn Wyoming, Star Valley, so I came to know of the man, Samuel Rawlins for whom the Rawlins Slough we call it Slew was named. It is a clear, slow moving large stream of water which runs through his farmer property just about 1/2 mile east of the center settlement of Auburn on the road east to Grover.

One of the deciding factor about moving out of the valley was loosing their stock for lack of feed when their haystacks were burned by children starting fires, so I was told.

There is one baby buried in the Auburn Cemetery which belongs to Samuel Rawlins (Edith Elva). There is also one of Sam's sisters Fermina Jane and Leavitt's baby is buried there (Harvey Mario). Anyway there are three little graves that we do not have names for and there are very old rocks for markers. They are side by side as I remember.

My Father Moses Peter Olasson CRONEY By Oclella Croney Shipley

Moses Peter Olasson Croney was born 15 March 1880 at Logan, Cache, Utah. The son of Nels Peter Olasson Croney, born 6 Mar 1824 at Hammarlov, Malmohus, Sweden, and Elsie Pedersen Christensen, born 20 Aug 1854 at Gerdunland, Denmark. We think that Grandfather must have added the name of Croney after coming to the United States.

Father was the fifth child in a family of twelve. He was blessed 6 May 1880 by Thomas McNeil. Baptized 15 Aug 1890 by Nels Peter Olasson Croney. Confirmed in 1890 by N. Graham. Endowed on 6 Dec 1962. Sealed 5 Jun 1963 by William A. Woolford. Witnesses Charles S. Cooper and Merril L. Green. The proxy for Dad was Wayne W. Summer and the proxy for Mother was Donna S. Summer.

His prothers and sisters were Selma, Aaron, Helena, Henriette, David; Annie Catherine, Emma, Nels, Daniel, Elsie and a step-sister Sabra Melvina. Sabra passed away 4 Nov 1918 during the flu epidemic. She is buried at Salmon, Idaho.

While Father was yet a small child, his folks moved to Snowflake, Arizona. While there the children got diphtheria. His sister Helena died 8 Jan 1882 and Henriette died 11 Jan 1882. Dad recovered but was not very well for a long time. They must have soon moved to Logan because Annie was born there the 15th of Aug 1882.

From Logan they moved to Minkcreek, Idaho. Aunt Emma was born there the 19th of Dec 1884. Uncle Nels was born in Riverdale, a short distance from Minkcreek, and David, Daniel, Elsie, and Sabra were all born at Minkcreek.

Grandfather was a carpenter. Dad said his father would buy a place and build a home on it then either trade or sell it for another without a house and start all over again. This kept the family in a state of continual movement.

Father had very little schooling. What little he received was at the school at Minkcreek. But, from the time he was a young child he was quite talented at drawing a talent that at one time almost got him into trouble. When some of the older boys got him to draw a very uncomplimentary picture of the local dance hall manager who was quite sure Dad had drawn it and rushed over to Grandfather with it. Dad stayed away as long as he could as he was sure Grandfather would give him a whipping, but he never did only

told him no more pictures like that.

At the age of 16, he left home to work for a sheep company near their home. He used to say that he was sold with those sheep. I am not sure if it was at this time that he first went to work for Woods Livestock Company or not but he did work for them for many years. Even after he and Mother (Lois Elzira Rawlins) were married and until after we four older girls were born.

He was married to Lois Elzira Rawlins 28 January 1907 at Idaho Falls, Idaho. The daughter of Samuel Lafayette Rawlins and Sarah Elizabeth Van Orden.

To this union was born eight children, Oclella, Maud, Mabel Elizabeth, Elsie Martell, Samuel Lafayette, who died at birth, Edna Elzira, Ethel Iona and Veda Wyora. Maud and I were born while the folks still lived at Idaho Falls where Dad was working at the brewery. They then moved to Basalt where Mabel was born. I do not know what Dad was working at while we lived there. I do know that while Mabel was still a baby we moved to what was known as the Kingport ranch at Pebble where Elsie was born. From there it was back to Spencer where Dad went back to work for Woods.

Somewhere during the years before this time Dad had learned to play the violin and he was very much in demand to play for the dances either at a school house or at a ranch home. They would start dancing early in the evening dance to midnight, have a big dinner and continue dancing until day break.

After leaving Spencer they moved back to Pebble country where they homesteaded 31 Dec 1917 and built there house the summer of 1918. That winter we all had the flu and for awhile we did not expect Dad to live but come spring, we found we were one of the few who had not lost at least one member of the family during the epidemic.

That spring and summer was spent grubbing sage brush in order to plant so many acres that the homestead law required and then the fencing had to be done. After the first summer Dad would plant the crops in the spring and then it was up to Mother and we older girls to keep things going at home while Dad worked at neighboring ranches in order to have some money to buy some of the things we needed so badly at home.

After several bleak years of trying to make a living on the homestead they sold the place and moved into a house at the limekiln. While at the homestead, Samuel, Edna and Ethel were born.

While living at the limekiln **Veda** was born. Soon after that Dad found a farm that he could get and they moved there. By that time, they already owned some horses, cows, pigs, chickens and farm machinery so life was not quite so rough. Every winter, from the time they had moved onto the homestead until they left the ranch on the Portneuf river, Dad had spent running trap lines around the mountains near their home some years doing quite well.

I never really lived with the folks after they moved to the ranch on the river. I was either away at school or working during this time. Between 1930 and 1932 Maud, Mabel, Elsie and I were married. Maud was married 2 January 1930 and passed away 25 January at Groveland.

In 1937 they gave up the idea of farming and moved to Lava Hot Springs. A move that meant another old house to be cleaned and fixed up to make it livable. Most of the work being left for Mother and the three younger girls as Dad again went to work for another sheep company.

Work was not easy to find during the depression years but as soon as he could find a job he quit the sheep company and came home. He worked several jobs until he started working as a gardener at the State Nat and for some neighbors. His yard was a show place in Lava.

Edna, Ethel and Veda were married while living at Lava.

Mother passed away in December of 1957. Dad remained at the home place in company of Uncle Bert.

Many times Dad was either ill or hurt during his life time. As a child he was in a runaway and suffered a broken arm which left him with one short arm. He was ill with the flu in 1918. One summer he suffered a sun stroke. One winter he was snow blind and had to spend a week or so in a dark room. I would get by a window with just enough light so I could read to him. One winter he broke his leg while on the trap line. He managed to get on his horse and it brought him home. He was hurt again when his horse threw him, pulling the ligaments loose in his back, and he had to spend most of the summer in bed.

His last illness was due to a weak heart and he passed away 12 February 1961 at the St. Anthony hospital in Pocatello, Idaho. He was buried 15 February 1961 at Chesterfield, Caribou County, Idaho. The roads were so bad, his last ride had to be in a truck to the cemetery.
