

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CHANCERY COURT FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY Francis Van Winkle and others vs. Francis Van Dyke and others

....would be perfectly immaterial and would no way affect...right of any of the parties neither do they know or believe it to be true, that the said Joh... Jeralman continued in possession of the said premises about three years for name of all the legatees mentioned in the wills recited and refered to in the said.... plaint . And these defendants further in answering say, that they do said Nicholas Van Dyke fraudulently and deceitfully took possession of the saidestate and they do expressly aver that the said Jacobus Jeralman surrendered the possession of such part of the premises as he had in occupation arguably to contract. And these defendants further say that the said Nicholas Van dyke did afterwards and in the time of the late war permit the said Jacobus Jeralman to enter into and live in part of the dwelling house upon the said plantation or homestead; and that some time thereafter he the said Nicholas Van dyke did turn the said Jacobus Jeralman out of the possession thereof and regained the same by a writ of forcible detainer in the due course of law. Van Dyke was entitled to the said plantation or homestead as heir at law.... said Hendrica Van Gieson that thereupon to steer clear of difficulties to give said....to all the parties and to walk according to the rules and principles of law the said F....Van Dyke desired this defendant to lay the will of the said Hendrica Van Gieson....a state of the case before counsel learned in the law that in consequence thereof this defendant did without delay apply for advice thereupon to John Morris Scott, a gentleman of distinguished talents in the law, who having considered the same gave his opinion so far as reflected the said homestead or plantation as follows: that is to say, Hendrica Van Gieson by her last will and testament dated the ninth of February in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty eight among other things therein mentioned wills as follows, that is to say"I do hereby order that the house and land whereon I now live be appraised with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging, and that my....and niece above mentioned to wit Francis Van Winkle and Anna the....Hendrick Van Blarkum? As by the said opinion now in the custody of this defendant and ready to be more fully appears and these defendants further in answering say, that the said Nicholas? Van Dyke did in due form of law among other things, give, grant, alien, and convey the...equeal third part of the said plantation or homestead unto his son the said Francis Van Dyke, one of these defendants in ffee as by the said deed bearing date the twenty second day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty one, in the custody of the defendants, or one of them, and ready to be produced, may more at large appears. 
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



(Are there two different Frans or did Frans marry twice with possibly the first wife and child dying? This would make the Nicolaas that we are tracing the second Nicolaas born/Christened in 1706.)





It is interesting that this case should show up in 1774 and Nicholas be mentioned as the only survivor of Francis Van Dyke. Nicholas' brother Francis died intestate in 1773 or 1774, and his goods were administered by his wife Sophia The action of settling his estate mentions that he was living in New Brunswick. At his death, this would leave Nicholas the only surviving child of Francis Van Dyke who died in 1752. This would make him sole possessor of properties held by Francis. This is reflected in the mention of properties being divided by Nicholas' three sons John, James and Francis which I have quoted above.

Finally I found the following references to Nicholas Van Dyke and his children in the court records of Essex County in 1783 and 1784.

This case also appears in the January and April terms of 1784, and states that a settlement was reached in favor of the plaintiff - Abraham Van Giesen. Now, if reference was made to the executors of Nicholas Van Dyke, wouldn't you think there was a will made somewhere? Well, if there was, I can't find it! There are indexes to all the wills left by individuals in New Jersey, and there is not one for Nicholas Van Dyke! A deed missing, and now a possible will! This has been more than I can stand. If the deed failed to mention Nicholas' daughter Elizabeth, then, his will certainly would. And, my guess is both would. Well, I can't find either one. The proof of whether Nichols' daughter Elizabeth was our ancestor not lay in one of these documents, I am sure.

Having determined the exact location of Nicholas Van Dyke's lands, I decided to see what churches existed in this area. To give a little background, I have enclosed portions of histories that explain how Newark Township got settled. Before 1800, the whole upper half of Essex County was Newark Township, the histories I have enclosed, helps you to see how this township got broken up into smaller townships, and you need to be familiar with these changes so you can follow what happened to Nicholas' land. It never changed, but it did get put into other townships when they were formed.

The farm or plantation I referred to above that was situated on the Passaic River and Third River is marked on the map I have enclosed. The Third River forms the border of Essex and Passaic Counties, and Nicholas' property was right near where these two river converged.

The other piece of property lying at a place called "Stone House." is explained in Document #1 which is the history dealing with Bloomfield Township, and I have marked its approximate location on the map I have enclosed. I can't tell whether Stone House came into possession of the Van Dyke's, or whether it was adjacent to it. There was an actual house called Stone House, and there is a picture of it in the history, but there is an area called "Stone House Plains", which essentially became North Bloomfield, and so the land deeded to the Van Dyke's could have been part of the "plain" rather than the actual house. Needless to say, there is undoubtedly a strong connection between the Van Giesens and the Van Dykes going clear back to Flatbush, the original origins of both families.

A further explanation of Essex is necessary here to help you understand the Van Dyke's connection with the area. When Newark Township was formed in 1661, a group of settlers from Connecticut came here first. There were no Dutch settlers in the town of Newark. But, within a short interval, the Dutch moved out of Bergen County and began settling in the upper portion of Newark Township (not to be confused with the town of Newark, which is also in the township of Newark). They spread along the corridor between the Second and Third Rivers (from approximately Bellville Township to the border of Essex and Passaic Counties on the East side by the Passaic River to Fairfield Township on the western reaches of Essex County. The area in between were settled by Dutch families mainly who came out of Bergen County. This became known as the "Dutch Lane". The Van Dykes, Van Giesen, Van Ripers, Van Winkles and a host of other Dutch families settled in this area, which I have marked in green on the enclosed map.

In my research this time, I noted that the Van Giesens, Van Ripers, Van Winkles and other Dutch families are mentioned in Essex County well into the nineteenth Century, but interestingly enough, the Van Dykes cease to be mentioned in this area before the end of the Eighteenth Century. Where did all the children of Nicholas and Maria Van Dyke go? I can find no evidence that they stayed in the Newark area or Essex County, except James who appears to have died there in 1820's. Where did Sophia, Johanna, John, Francis, Elizabeth, Richard (Derck) and Henry go? Did Richard go to North Carolina along with his sister Elizabeth? The evidence seems to suggest that they did.

This time I found more critical references to Nicholas Van Dyke. I hate going through court records, but sometimes they provide invaluable information about an individual. These records, of course, are not indexed usually so you have to read page by page to see what is in them. I read the records of the court of Common Peas of Essex County from 1750 to 1785, and it was time consuming work. There were several cases that appeared between the Van Giesens and the Van Dykes. I need to explain the relationship between these two families because they are connected in some way.

Hendrica (called Hannah in the marriage record) Van Dyke married Hendrick (Henry) Van Giesen december 24, 1750 at the Dutch Reformed Church at Second River (Belleville). He died in 1765, and Henrica died in 1768. She left a will where she mentions some nieces and nephews. Deeds regarding the distribution of her properties mention even more nieces and nephews. It appears to me that she died childless and probably that is because she was married at a rather late age. When you consider that her brother Nicholas married about 1729 and her brother Francis married about the same time, or perhaps, a bit earlier, it makes you wonder how old Hendrica was in 1750 when she married. My guess is that she was probably well past thirty, perhaps, closer to forty. Anyway, I am sure that Hendrick Van Giesen, whom she married was connected to Abraham Van Giesen in someway, perhaps, a son.

My intention was to introduce you to the Abraham Van Giesen because he is mentioned prominently in the deeds connected with Nicholas Van Dyke. He is also involved in several court cases involving the Van Dykes. I found a short history about the Van Giesens (see document #1) which will help you put my discussion here into perspective. The two sons, Bastien and Abraham, who settled in Newark Township, and their descendants are the ones who, I am pretty sure, show up in the court records of Essex County with the Van Dykes. In fact, several references to court cases involved "Abraham Bastian (Bastien) Van Giesen. The Abraham mentioned here would be the son of Bastien Van Giesen. I find it interesting that in the history I have enclosed of this family, it parallels the Van Dyke family pretty closely. Reynier Bastiensen Van Giesen, the father of Bastien and Abraham, who settled in Newark was from Flatbush, Long Island. Reynier came to Bergen County and died there in 1707. The earlier generations of the Van Dykes also lived at Flatbush on Long Island. It is amazing the connections with these two families. Francis Van Dyke shows up in Newark around 1720, but it makes me wonder where he came from before settling in Newark. Flatbush comes to mind.

In the deed I quoted in my last research report where Francis Van Dyke settles with his two brother, James and John Van Dyke, the properties given to them by their father, Nicholas. Let me quote excerpts fro this deed that helps to describe these properties because they become important in showing the connection between the Van Dykes and the Van Giesens, and determining the exact locations of these farms. Let me quote the excerpts here. This deed is quoted in my last report so you can refer back to it if you want to find these excerpts in their full context.

...release and confirm unto them, the said James Van Dyke and John Van Dyke, their heirs and assigns forever, one third part of all that farm or plantation adjoining Passaick River near the Third River and adjoining the farm of Abraham Van Giesen, north and south in the Township of Newark,..."

..Also, on third part of a piece of lund lying at a place called Stone House in the same township aforesaid, being in the possession of ?, Abraham, and Phistien (Bastien?) Van Giesen and ? Van Winkle..."

This shows that not only were Abraham Van Giesen and Nicholas Van Dyke neighbors, they were transferring their lands to one another. The Van Giesens apparently built the "Stone House" mentioned in the history of Bloomfield I enclosed, and somehow the Van Dykes have properties in the same places.

Let me sight some of the court cases where these families are mentioned together.



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ber of settlers. To keep this peace, companies of Rangers patrolled the region.

The company that covered the region from the Smith River to the Yadkin was under the command of General Anthony Hampton, (father of Wade H. Hampton). These Rangers were clad in hunting shirts and white buckskin leggings. They ranged the woods far and wide, living off the land and sleeping where night caught them. They covered this territory once each month.

Taxes And The Crown

For the next few years life returned to normal for these early Stokes County settlers, rebuilding homes. Work on the road to Salem and politics were concerns. Then came the Regulator Movement. This region was much involved in the Regulator Movement and along the Town Fork and Yadkin the main thought was lower taxes, or no taxes at all.

On March 7, 1771, a public meeting was held in Salisbury, a committee was formed, and armed with the authority of the people. This committee met with all officers of the Crown, and compelled them to give up their ill gotten gains. Samuel Waggoner, a Town Forkman, was a member of this committee. He was later exempted from an offer of pardon as a Regulator.

The Regulator Movement was short lived in Sauraland. By mid-summer, 1771, the Regulators were subdued, and the stage was set for serious insurrection — the Revolution.

THE HOUSE ON NEATMAN CREEK ... AND ITS PEOPLE

The earliest Moravian Records refer to them as "a considerable number of Irish" and later as "families of people from the Jersey's" thus surely designating the background of the Town Fork Settlement to the north of the Wachovia tract in what is now Stokes. They claimed the fertile bottomland along Townfork Creek of Dan River and up the tributaries running out of the Sauratown Mountains.

For only two decades, this had been called the Upper Sauratown Tract by the first white explorers, since they found a small band of Indians they called Saura's living here, hunting along these creeks. The tribe was now gone and these Irish (better called Scotch-Irish) from Jersey quickly claimed the land they left.

Settlers such as Henry Banner; Valentine Frey's sons; James Hampton and in another place Ann Hampton; and the Davis' (David, Philip and Morgan) were all strung out along the Townfork. At the same time on Neatman Creek, a tributary to the north, Daniel Davis chose a tract which he too homesteaded.

In characteristic fashlon this Sctoch-Irishman, perhaps feeling crowded in by relatives, did not set his roots too deep and as the

18th century closed (1799). Daniel Davis sold about the same size. Woodwork here and

most of his land including the homestead tract to a kinsman, Edmund Davis and headed further south to another land. On January 2, 1803, he is listed as living in Pendleton County, South Carolina. He sold the last of his tract (183 acres) on both sides of Neatman Creek to Ezekiel Frost.

The Frost Family

Frost also was apparently a Scotch-Irishman. Several members of the Frost family had settled in Rockingham County including James and Jonas who are listed as heads of individual families in the 1790 census. Based on the re-use of the name in later generations. it is assumed that Ezekiel was the son of James Frost. At any rate on February 10, 1798 in Rockingham County, Ezekiel at 23 married 22 year old Elizabeth Buckanan. This couple had thus been married almost five years when they took possession of the homestead on Neatmans Creek. Perhaps they occupied a small log building already on the tract as they were as yet apparently childless. The home that the Daniel Davis family had built must have been sold to Edmund Davis.

At any rate, the date of the construction of the Frost house on Neatman Creek seems to have been during 1803. The floor plan was simple yet the construction was of a better quality than the ordinary house of the day in Stokes County. Two downstairs rooms each had front, six pane entrance doors, hung with a base molding and a chair rail. A large fireplace was faced with a tall mantel flanked by two small windows. Another six panel door led into the second of the first floor rooms which was slightly larger and may have been the sitting room. This room was very like the first except that it had a back door and a boxed in second floor. The mantel in this room was more formal with dental work across the face. The plaster walls in each of these rooms was unpainted. The woodwork in the sitting room was a rich blue and in the other room an olive green.

Under the stairs there was a storage area and a small locked compartment was set in the face of the stairs near the ceiling. The stairs led to a second floor hallway then into two bedrooms. One was over the dining room and was

about the same size. Woodwork here and elsewhere upstairs was also blue. There was a fireplace in this room but the small bedroom had none.

From the hall, the stairs wound up to the open upper floor which was unfinished but could be used for sleeping with pairs of small windows in the gable ends on either side of the chimney.

Exterior Description

The exterior of the house was in some ways imposing, set as it was against a hillside. From the front it looked more than two stories and a walkway of large stones led to a one story porch. The frame siding was painted a cream or beige and the doors and solid panel shutters hung on the small windows were yellow trimmed with white. Stone chimneys rose on each side of the building and beneath the house was a root cellar.

But, what of the people who made this house come alive? Soon after it was finished Ezekiel and Elizabeth Frost began their family. We only know of the two girls, Catharine and Elizabeth, and a son James Buchanan, born July 27, 1808. There may have been others but only these survived childhood. Ezekiel set to the development of his tract both agriculturally and by exploting the iron ore found along the banks of the Neatman Creek.

The Mineral Riches

The earliest settlers in Stokes County north of the Wachovia tract had quickly recognized that the land around the Sauratown was rich with mineral resources. James Martin who came to the county about 1768 as a Indian Agent and served as a Colonel in the Revolutionary War of the next decade was typical. His claim included both a Lime Kiln and an Iron Works. Peter Hairston, who amassed several thousand acres in Stokes County, joined with Martin in ownership of the Independence Iron Works.

As in other sections along the east coast, the colonists "dug ore from veins near the surface of the ground. A second necessity was a lime was a lime flux which would combine with the non-metallic parts of the ore to make a brittle glassy slag. All through the colonies in

Petree family was on the farm located near Neatman Creek, approximately three miles north of the present town of Germanton. In 1795 Jacob gave part of his farm to his son John Henry, and in 1798 he gave the remainder of his holdings to his youngest son, Jacob Jr. Some of Jacob's children had left this area, moving west or into nearby counties. Others had obtained farms of their own, also along Neatman Creek. There is some evidence that Jacob first settled about two miles west of the Neatman Creek location, possibly as early as 1799.

Jacob and his family were very active church people. Jacob was an elder and trustee in the Beaver Dam Lutheran Church. He and Adam Geiger were two of the people instrumental in starting this church.

Jacob died in 1804 and is buried at the Lutheran church he helped found. His wife is also buried at this church, as are Henry and his wife. All graves are marked except Jacobs.

After Jacob's death his children, who remained in Stokes Co., and his grandsons purchased farms up and down Neatman and Town Fork creeks and throughout the years the descendants of Jacob Petree have been involved in agriculture, medicine, education, politics, law, industry and church activities in Stokes County and other locations.

Born in Stokes County, January 25, 1849, son of Riley Frost Petree and Oletha M. Helsabeck Petree. He was born about 4 miles north of Germanlon, N.C., near Neatman Creek. He was the grandson of Henry Petree and Rebecca Buchanan.

Frank Petree married Juliann F. Rierson of Stokes County. She was the daughter of William Golding Rierson and Malinda S. Allen, grandaughter of Stephen and Mary (Kime) Ryerson. They had the following children:

Frank was a farmer all his life. His farm was located north of Germanton in the Friendship community. This farm was known as "Cherry Hill."

He was active in the affairs of Stokes County, supporter of all rural development projects. He was a member of the Board of Directors of the Mountain View Institute, a liberal supporter of the Stokes County Fair Association and a major stockholder in this association. A 1914 publication of the *Stokes County Citizens* states that he was a man with keen business ability and trusted by all.

Mr. Frank died Oct. 12, 1927 and his son,




Francis E. and Julia Petree.

Robert G. (Bob) stayed on at the old home and took care of his mother while farming and raising his family. Julia died Oct. 27, 1944. Both are buried at Corinth Christian Church, about 2 miles north of Germanton, N.C.

RILEY FROST PETREE

Riley Frost Petree, born in 1820, was the great grandson of John Jacob Petry, who imported from Germany to Pennsylvania when he was 21 years old and later settled in pre-Revolutionary times near Germanton in what is now Stokes Co., N.C.

Riley Frost Petree was the fourth child of Henry Petree and Rebecca Buchanan. The name "Frost" came from his mother's brother-in-law, Ezekial Frost, who was a large landowner in the county.

Riley Frost married Olethia Mary Helsabeck in 1845. Olethia was the daughter of Jacob and Mary Elizabeth Doub Helsabeck. They had eleven children: Jacob, who moved to Arkansas, Frank. Rebecca, Wesley, Riley Jeffrey, Margaret, Nathaniel, Ellen, David Heaton, who moved to Florida, and Flora and Joseph.

Riley Frost lived on a farm near Germanton. He was interested in public affairs as well as in his farm and family. After the Civil War a Constitutional Convention was called to meet in Raleigh. January 14 to March 17, 1868. Riley F. Petree, from District 19 represented Stokes County in this session in which several changes were made from previous constitutions. Riley Frost was a man of integrity and was willing to work to help rebuild peace in the state. The constitution written then was basically the same 100 years and more later.

Riley Frost Petree took pride in what he did and passed this pride on to his family. He died in 1902 at the home of his son Riley Jeffrey Petree. He was buried in the Corinth Church of Christ Cemetery.

Riley Jeffrey Petree, son of Riley Frost Petree and Olethia Helsabeck Petree was born November 9, 1853 in Stokes Co. and lived near Germanton all his life. He was a successful farmer and a prominent man in the affairs of the county. He was a strong Republican and a leading politician in his section of the county, an area which usually voted Democratic wilh a majority of Democratic voters. However, Riley J. (Rike) Petree was elected sheriff for the county for two terms, from 1903 to 1907.

Prior to that time, from 1893 to 1903, he served as a member of the House of Representatives from Stokes County. He was a member of the Finance and Claims Commit-

Sincerely Craig Rawlins Pres Julia Rawlins See. Well, this started a long and fruitless search for the will of Nicholas Van Dyke. I looked in every conceivable probate court in both New Jersey and New York, and I could not find it. There are real complications with the probate courts in New York. I have enclosed a summary explanation of the probate courts in New York State from early New Amsterdam to well into the 19th Century. You can see that during the period of the Revolutionary War, probate matters were handled by various courts. The problem was particularly accute for New York City. The British occupied the city during the years of the Revolution, and it appears that records were not well kept during this period (1776-1783). Nicholas Van Dyke died in 1782-1783, which is at the very end of this rather tumultuous period. Is there a chance that his will did not survive. Was it even recorded in the state of New York? The wills that survived for New York State, were gathered into one spot and kept. Abstracts of the wills that survived were recorded in the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society publications. No will for Nicholas Van Dyke is recorded.

The question I have is where his will finally got settled and when. Careful thought tells you that a copy of his will was still in existence in 1802 when the case was in Chancery, and this case was being tried in New Jersey, not New York. I wanted to search Chancery further, but I ran into problems in trying to find them after 1802. These records needed to be searched after 1802, but I was not able to find them.

There was an index to the Chancery Court Proceedings of New York State, and I searched this for Nicholas Van Dyke. Interestingly, I found a case for a Nicholas Van Dyke dating from 1834 to 1840. The problem is that the library does not have the original records for this court, so I could not examine the references to the case of Nicholas Van Dyke and determine whether it was an extension of the case that took place in New Jersey between 1789 and 1802. I may want to have an agent look at these documents to determine whether litigation continued on for another forty years up to the 1840's. I have wondered about this because it is New York. Did the case get transferred from New Jersey to New York? Is it two different cases? I put this aside for the time being.

I had been through every conceivable court in New Jersey, and I had searched the Chancery court proceedings in New York. I had also looked at every probate court jurisdiction in both New Jersey and New York, and I had not been successful in locating the will of Nicholas Van Dyke. I finally decided that I needed to call the New Jersey State Archives in Trenton to see if I could get further clarification on what other records might exist for Chancery. I was put in touch with an archivist who explained that there was a good chance that further litigation followed after 1802. She said there were indexes for cases after this time, and if I would state the particulars of the case, she would try and discover further references to the case of Francis Van Dyke and Francis Van Winkle. She thought there was a good chance that a copy of the will would be enclosed in the file of this case. So, I sent a letter to her, and hopefully, I will get a reply from her with positive results.

Little could I have imagined how difficult this would be to try and find the will of Nicholas Van Dyke. I have to believe that a copy of it survives. It is a matter of discovering the final results of all the litigation that took place over legacies left in the wills of Hedrica Van Giesen, Elizabeth Broadbury and Nicholas Van Dyke. When I can discover this, I believe I will find a copy of his

will. I have seen cases where such litigation drags on for years. The key is to discover how long it dragged on, and how it finally was concluded. I have to believe that Nicholas will make mention of his daughter Elizabeth and hopefully give some indication whom she married. That's all I want to know. Pray that it was James Frost. No, just pray that I can find out whom she married Period! It will bring to an end, one way or the other, any connection this family had with our Isabella (Elizabeth) Van Dyke who married James Frost. I will send you an addendum report to this one when I receive a report from the archivist at the State Archives of New Jersey. Oh, this has to be the link. I have worked too hard on this to have it otherwise. Depending on what I get back in the report, I will probably do some more research before I send the final report.

I have loved working on this line. It has been a real challenge, but I have learned a lot. I have gathered enough on this family, and I will probably not do more at this time if the will of Nicholas Van Dyke is found, and we discover that we have no connection to this man. If you have any questions or comments, please feel free to contact me.

This year's challenge

This has been a long and involved research period. I worked on the Van Dyke line again, and I found a lot of things on Nicholas Van Dyke and Maria Van Orden. There isn't a lot that I don't know about this couple, except who their daughter Elizabeth married. I found a great deal on this family in court records, and I also found the christening of Nicholas Van Dyke taking place in New York City at the old Dutch Reformed Church in the city. I think I also found the christening of Nicholas' father Francis in the same church taking place in the 1670's. Let me discuss in detail what I found on this family this research period in the records of New York and New Jersey.

From previous reports, you will recall that I had traced Nicholas and Maria Van Dyke from New Brunswick, New Jersey to New York City. From what I found this time, it appears that Nicholas, himself never settled in Essex County, New Jersey. It was his sons, Francis and James that settled in this area. Nicholas and Maria moved to New York City sometime around 1749, or before this. I know this is the case because this couple had two children christened in the Reformed Church in the middle of New York City. There was Josÿntje (Josina) born in 1749 and Johannes (John) born in 1754. I have enclosed photocopies of the register for your records. Both John and Josina married in the Dutch Reformed Church where they were christened, and as far as I can tell John remained in New York City. Some accompanying documents connected with the Chancery Court of New Jersey actually identifies this John as being from New York City at the time the case was before this court in the 1790's.

Nicholas Van Dyke was from the city of New York for most of his life, and I found that he was christened there in 1706. I have enclosed photocopies of the christenings of the early Dutch Church in New York City. You can see that Francis Van Dyke and his wife Sÿtje Dirk, who married in New York in 1701, had most of their children christened in New York before moving to Essex County, New Jersey. It is only logical that Nicholas would return to New York City because his father, Francis Van Dyke, lived there before moving to Essex County, New Jersey. It was Francis who owned the property between Second River (Belleville) and Third River in Essex County. Nicholas Van Dyke inherited this land, but I do not think that he ever lived on it. His sons, Francis and James appear to have been the ones who remained in Essex County and lived

on this property. The deed to this property seems to indicate that his two sons, Francis and James, plus John are the ones who were given right to the property in New Jersey, while Nicholas and Maria remained in New York City.

l even found what I think is the christening of Francis Van Dyke in the 1670's in New York City Dutch Reformed Church. More work could be done on this, but there was no point going back further until I could establish a connection between Elizabeth Van Dyke, the one who married James Frost, and this Nicholas and Maria Van Dyke living in New York City. This is where I got into long and somewhat frustrating search for any evidence that would link Elizabeth (Van Dyke) Frost to this couple. I learned more about this family from court records than I ever imagined

This family seems to have had a great deal of difficulty in settling differences over estates that were left. I went through twenty years worth of records for the Court of Common Pleas of Essex County (1766-1784), and they were full of cases pertaining to this family. Nicholas' sisters Hendrica Van Giesen and Elizabeth Broadbury left wills, and members of the family contested the legacies left by these two women. In both instances, Nicholas and Francis Van Dyke, brothers of these two women served as executors of their wills. Previous reports that I sent to you discuss the content of the wills left by these two women. Nicholas Van Dyke died sometime before June 1783, because a case in the June term, 1783 of this court contains a case between Abraham Van Giesen and the executors of Nicholas Van Dyke (Court of Common Pleas, Essex County, Liber G, 1781-1783). I enclosed documents from this case last time, and as you will recall from these documents they mention the executors of Nicholas Van Dyke. This certainly suggest that he left a will. I am not certain the cause of all of this litigation, but it must have increased in intensity. A case in the June term, 1782, Francis Van Winkle charged Francis Van Dyke with trespass and assault, and it appears he was found guilty of the charge (Court of Common Pleas of Essex County, Liber G June Term, 1782). I stopped searching in the court of Common Pleas about 1785, and I could see later on that I should have continued my search in these records further, but I began searching in the Chancery Court Proceedings.

In box 72, of the Chancery Court Proceedings, I found a case between Francis Van Dyke and others vs. Francis Van Winkle and others [Jan, 1789]-[Sept, 1802]. Francis Van Dyke and others turns out to be the executors of the last will and testament of Nicholas Van Dyke, namely, his sons Francis, John and James Van Dyke. This was the proof I needed. It leaves no doubt that Nicholas Van Dyke left a will because this case doesn't just say executors. It says "executors of the last will and testament of Nicholas Van Dyke". A lot of the documents in this case were water stained and hard to read on the film. The thing that amazed me about this case was the duration of it. It began in Chancery in 1789 and continued until 1802. This case, also involved the legacies left in the wills of Hendrica Van Giesen and Elizabeth Broadbury. Hendrica left a will in 1768 and Elizabeth left one in 1773. By 1802, when the last references I found in Chancery of this suit, it had been 35 years since Hendrica had left her will. I wondered how long this went on after 1802!

What I wanted to know is what happened to the will left by Nicholas Van Dyke. Could there have been further litigation? The wills of Hendrica Van Giesen and Elizabeth Broadbury, plus that of Nicholas Van Dyke, who left a will in about 1783 could have extended well beyond 1802.

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CHANCERY COURT FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY Francis Van Winkle and others vs. Francis Van Dyke and others

....would be perfectly immaterial and would no way affect...right of any of the parties neither do they know or believe it to be true, that the said Joh... Jeralman continued in possession of the said premises about three years for name of all the legatees mentioned in the wills recited and refered to in the said.... plaint ... And these defendants further in answering say, that they do said Nicholas Van Dyke fraudulently and deceitfully took possession of the saidestate and they do expressly aver that the said Jacobus Jeralman surrendered the possession of such part of the premises as he had in occupation arguably to contract. And these defendants further say that the said Nicholas Van dyke did afterwards and in the time of the late war permit the said Jacobus Jeralman to enter into and live in part of the dwelling house upon the said plantation or homestead; and that some time thereafter he the said Nicholas Van dyke did turn the said Jacobus Jeralman out of the possession thereof and regained the same by a writ of forcible detainer in the due course of law. And these defendants further in answering say, that they do not know of any undue means or practices whatsoever....having been made use of by these defendants or any other person in the last s.... the said Nicholas Van Dyke or at any other time in order to prevent the said Nic.... from doing justice to the said complainants respecting the premises....defendants say that the said Francis Van Dyke their uncle died.... month of July in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy four?....the said Francis Van Dyke, one of these defendants, in answering sa....shortly after the death of the said Francis Van Dyke, the co-exutor aforesaid he this? defendant did wish to his widow requesting to be informed whether he had left a last will and testament and if so, who were appointed the executors thereof, or had the management of his estate, thereupon some time in the month of August in the year of our Lord one thosand seven hundred and seventy four, William Van Daussen of New Brunswick called upon this defendant at the request and in behalf of the widow of the said Francis Van Dyke deceased, and expressed himself as having seen the last will and testament of the said Hendrica Van Gieson and that in his conception of the matter the said Nichol... Van Dyke was entitled to the said plantation or homestead as heir at law.... said Hendrica Van Gieson that thereupon to steer clear of difficulties to give said....to all the parties and to walk according to the rules and principles of law the said F....Van Dyke desired this defendant to lay the will of the said Hendrica Van Gieson...a state of the case before counsel learned in the law that in consequence thereof this defendant did without delay apply for advice thereupon to John Morris Scott, a gentleman of distinguished talents in the law, who having considered the same gave his opinion so far as reflected the said homestead or plantation as follows: that is to say, Hendrica Van Gieson by her last will and testament dated the ninth of February in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty eight among other things therein mentioned wills as follows, that is to say"I do hereby order that the house and land whereon I now live be appraised with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging, and that my....and niece above mentioned to wit Francis Van Winkle and Anna the....Hendrick Van Blarkum? Have liberty to take it at the appraisement andequally between them" - and in another clause she wills their "I do hereby order....my remaining estate real and personal wheresoever and whatsoever to be equally divided between my brothers and sisters, Nicholas and Francis Van Dyke and the widows Broadbury and Van Winkle share and share alike to their only proper use and behoof forever." and appoints her brothers Nicholas and

Francis her executors and heirs after her decease her nephew and niece for a valuable considerationreleased and renounced under their seals, to the executors their claim to the said house and land. This insturment has not been shared? With me . Francis the executor is since deceased and has left four daughters (two of them married) co heirssses, Nicholas the other executor and heir at law to the testator is still alive, the widow Van Winkle in her life time....all her interest in the estate to her son Francis, and the widow Bradbury by her will divided all her estate in certain parts among her brothers, sisters, nephews, and nieces upon this case the following question is put, to wit, in whom does the house and land which she gives liberty to her nephew and niece to take at an appraisement now rest - answer: it appears to me that no estate whatsoever the house and land mentioned in the first clause -vested in the nephew and niece, but only a ... right to elect and take an estate in simple therein at an appraised value, that consequently the said house and land disern...las Van Dyke the heir of the said testatrix; that of the instrument executed by theis clearly expressive of their relinguishment of their right to elect and take the house....at an appraised value their election is absolutely determined. But as their th....estate in the said house and lands vests in the heir at law, yet doubt may....whether the residuary legatees have not an equitable interest in it, on a supposed....had the estate passed upon the appraised value, they would have had an interest....the monies thence arising the solution of this doubt will depend on a due consideration of the words in the second clause above noticed on which I am of the opinion that the words all my remaining estate real and personal will not give the residuary Lessees? And legatees any interest in the house and land, nor any equity to compel the heirs to fill in order to a division of the monies thence to arise because as the estate descended in to the heir at law, there could be no remainder to pass by these words. Nor do I think that any monies that might be suspposed to arise by a sale ... a sale comp....as the testatrix's personal estate. John Morris Scott. New York. 15th Aug....

As by the said opinion now in the custody of this defendant and ready to be more fully appears and these defendants further in answering say, that the said Nicholas? Van Dyke did in due form of law among other things, give, grant, alien, and convey the...equeal third part of the said plantation or homestead unto his son the said Francis Van Dyke, one of these defendants in ffee as by the said deed bearing date the twenty second day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty one, in the custody of the defendants, or one of them, and ready to be produced, may more at large appears. And the said Francis Van dyke one of these defendants further in answering says, that the said Nicholas Van Dyke, his said father claimed all or the greater part of the real estate of the said Hendrica Van Gieson as her heir at law and that a year or two before the late war, that the said Francis Van Winkle went to New York and applied to the said Nicholas Van Dyke to some.... promise with him, respecting the homestead of the said Hendrica Van Gieson. And that the said Nicholas Van Dyke? desirous of having the good will of the said Francis Van Winkle and to put....all disputes, accepted the offer of the said Francis Van Winkle, whe...agreed and concluded upon by the said parties that he, the said Nicholas Van Dyke....to the said Francis Van Winkle and his heirs, all his right and interest insaid lot of Woodland containing about thirty acres and adjoining the land of James....and others at Second River and likewise, the said Francis Van Winkle would release to the said Nicholas Van Dyke and his heirs all his claim in and to the said plantation or homestead; that the writings were drawn accordingly, but the said Francis Van Winkle never executed the same on his part?, although he solemnly promised so to do. And these defendants further in answering say that the said Nicholas Van Dyke, their said father, did on or about the twenty second day fo June in

the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty one, make his last will and testatment in writing and executed the same in the presence of three credible witnesses in due form of law; in which said last will and testament the said Nicholas Van Dyke did among other things devise in the following manner, that is to say,....having conveyed granted and confirmed unto my son, Francis Van Dyke by deed of gift the one third of all my real estate remainder or remaining two thirds my will is, that it be equally divided....James Van Dyke and John Van Dyke, share and share alike, their heir...administrators and assigns forever, and these defendants further say....said Nicholas Van Dyke the said testator departed this life the thirteenth day of July in the year of our Lord seventeen hundred and eighty two, without altering or revising his last will and testament aforesaid-and these defendants fuirther in answering say that the said Francis Van Dyke one of these defendants for and in consideration of eight hundred pounds lawful money of the state of New York and of a certain lease from the said James Van Dyke and John Van Dyke, their heirs and assigns forever, among other things, the one third part of the said plantation or homestead with the appurtenances as by the deed in the custody of the said James Van Dyke and John Van Dyke or one of them and ready to be produced bearing date on or about the sexteenth day of September in the year of our Lord seventeen hundred and eighty two may more at large....And the said John Van Dyke and James Van Dyke, two of these defendants further answering say, that they have been informed,....believe and expect to....Francis Van Winkle hath repeatedly committed asle on the said plan...by cutting and causing to be cut wood and timber on the same; thatthe instituted against one Adoniam? Bri..., and agent of the said Francis Van Winkle before one of the justices of the peace in and for the said county of Essex under of the legislature of this state in such cases made and provided that the said Adonian Brittain?...entered into bond according to the directions of the said act, and that thereupon an action of trespass was commenced against the said Adoniam Brittain in the Supreme Court of judicature of the this state, where the same would have been decided before this time of said complainants had not by means of artful suggestions obtained from this high court a Writ of Injunction to stay proceedings at common law - These defendants further in answering say, that they deny all combination and con....wherewith they stand charged in....the said bill of complaint; without that there is any other matter? or thing material or necessary for the these defendants to...and not herein before demanded and well and sufficiently....unto avoided....and things these defendants are ready and willing to aver., justify....this honorable court shall direct, and humbly pray to... costs and charges in their behalf wrongfully sustained....-


