#### SARGAENT GASPARD MABILLE

GASPARD MABILLE was born GASPARD D'MAILLY, son of SEIGNEUR PIERRE D'MAILLY of NEUVY-SUR-LOIRE, NIEVRE, FRANCE and ANTIONETTE D'DUMOND of NOYANT, MAINE-ET-LOIRE, ANJOU, FRANCE. He was born, however, in NAARDEN, HOLLAND, two years after his parents had fled FRANCE, due to RELIGIOUS PERSECUTION and his father changed his SURNAME to MABILLE. His birthday was in Aug 1575. The story of his parents exodus from FRANCE is given in PIERRE's history.

Not much is heard of GASPARD while he was growing up. His name became CASPER, which was the DUTCH way of spelling. He joined the DUTCH ROYAL NAVAL FORCES while still young and from this position he gained the TITLE of SARGAENT CASPER. He married a young FRENCH GIRL, whose family had also fled FRANCE near the time his parents did. She was SARRENTJE (SARAH) COYNE DU BOIS. Her mother was RENEE COYNE and her father was JACQUES DU BOIS. The DU BOIS FAMILY as well as the family of his mother, DUMOND, figures prominently in later years intermarrying with the VAN ORDEN FAMILY.

SARGAENT CASPER and his family remained in HOLLAND. The children's Birth and Marriage records are in AMSTERDAM. However, on THREE occasions, of which we have record, mentions his visits to AMERICA.

- (1) In 1650, he was witness to a BAPTISMAL. Entry at the DUTCH REFORMED CHURCH in NEW AMSTERDAM, he assisted his son, PIETERESE CASPERSZEN.
- (2) On 6 Nov 1651, he was chief witness of the BAPTISM of his GRAND-SON, naming him "CASPER DE SARGAENT". The entry states, "SARGAENT CASPER, attached to the DUTCH ROYAL NAVY". On that date also, he assisted his son, PIETERESE CASPERSZEN in witnessing the BAPTISM of JORIS, son of JORIS HOMER, a friend.
- (3) On 12 Feb 1652, he brought suit against JAN PEEK of PEEKSKILL, NEW YORK.

Since nothing more is recorded of SARGAENT CASPER in AMERICAN RECORDS, after that time, it can be safely assumed that he returned to HOLLAND and lived with his family. For records of his children see GROUP SHEET.

#### LOUIS XI-KING OF FRANCE

The son of CHARLES VII, LOUIS was an exceptionally troublesome dauphine. Married against his will at thirteen (1436) to MARGARET of SCOTLAND, daughter of JAMES I and JANE BEAUFORT. MARGARET was born in SCOTLAND in 1424. LOUIS was born in 1423 in BOURGES, FRANCE. LOUIS avenged himself by ignoring MARGARET and cultivating MISTRESSES. MARGARET was a lonely princess, having lived a very secluded life in SCOTLAND, only to be married in FRANCE and be ignored by her husband. She loved poetry and began writing poems when she was left alone so much by LOUIS. KING CHARLES felt sorry for her and took her with him on one of his campaigns. There she caught a chill which developed into an illness from which she died in 1445 at CHALONS-SUR-MARNE, FRANCE.

LOUIS rebelled against his father and fled to FLANDERS, to wait, fretfully, until he could take over the KINGSHIP. CHARLES did accommodate his son, by starving himself to death in 1461.

LOUIS was a thin and ungainly character. Homely and meloncholy, with distrustful eyes and a far reaching nose. He looked like a peasant, dressed like an impoverished pilgrim in rough gray gown and a shabby felt hat. He was only 29 years of age when he plighted himself to six-year old CHARLOTTE of SAVOY. He married her six years later when she was 12 years old. She was such a child that when she bore her first child for him, the babe, a son, died in infancy. Her first living child was a girl, of which LOUIS took no notice. She later bore him two more daughters and two more sons, whose existance was scarcely noted by their father.

LOUIS scorned the POMP of FEUDALISM. He laughed at traditions and formalities, questioned his own legitimacy and shocked all THRONES with his simplicity. LOUIS had little time to spare, even for a wife as amiable and chaste as CHARLOTTE. His oppressions had stirred the great Vassals of the CROWNS, and driven them to form leagues against him and he found his country a mere collection of scattered provinces and himself scarcely more powerful than his own strongest Vassel. LOUIS lived in the gloomy PALACE of LES TOURNELLES in PARIS or in the CHATEAU of PLESSIS-LES-TOURS, a hunting lodge his father had kept, which he had re-done. He lived a bachelor-like existance, in spite of his devoted wife. His goal was for two things. (1) He wanted an HEIR, which he did not get until 1470 and (2) he wanted FRANCE'S UNIFICATION and RE-BIRTH. He kept only a few attendants, ate such food as any peasant might afford. He looked, not an iota, but would be, every inch, a KING. OUR ROYAL ANCESTOR.

He subordinated every element of character in his resolve that FRANCE should, under his hammer, be forged out of the FEUDAL FRAGMATION, into a MONARCHY with UNITY and MONOLITHIC STRENGTH, and, that this centralized MONARCHY should lift FRANCE out of the ashes of war, to a New LIFE AND POWER. He was unsuccessful in WAR and preferred DIPLOMACY, ESPIONAGE and BRIBERY to FORCE. He brought men around to his purposes by persuasion, flattery or fear and kept a large staff of spies in his service at home and abroad. He attended to details of the government and forgot nothing. He spared time for LITERATURE and ART, He READ avidly. He collected manuscripts, recognized the revolution that PRINTING presaged and enjoyed the company of educated men and beautiful women.

In his SELF-EXILE in FLANDERS, he had formed an ACADEMY of SCHOLARS, who salted their lives with jolly tales. He was hard on the rich, careless of the poor, hostile to the Artisan Guilds, favorable to the Middle-class, who were his strongest supporters. He was ruthless with any who opposed him, regardless of class. He visited the SACRED SHRINES, conscripted RELICS, bribed the SAINTS to his service and took the VIRGIN into partnership with himself in his WARS. With the help of his faults, he created a MODERN FRANCE. He made it a NATION, the most powerful in LATIN CHRISTIANDOM. He brought in SILK WEAVERS from ITALY, MINERS from GERMANY He improved harbors and transport. He protected FRENCH SHIPPING with a NAVY. He opened new markets to FRENCH INDUSTRY and allied the GOVERNMENT of FRANCE with the rising MERCANTILE and FINANCIAL BOURGEOISLE. FEUDALISM was no longer needed for the protection and management of AGRICULTURE. The peasantry was slowly freeing itself from the stagnant serfdom and the rights were restricted to trespass on other's property. He forbade the ESTATES to wage private wars and demanded of them all, back dues they had failed to pay.

He slipped into war with DUKE FRANCIS of BRITTANY, who had captured his father years before and took BRITTANY away from him. He made a friend of CHARLES, DUKE OF BURGANDY and went to fight with him. He fought the BARONS and subdued them. He accomplished for FRANCE that NATIONAL UNIFICATION and CENTRALIZED ADMINISTRATION which he so wanted.

In 1470, his wife finally gave him an HEIR, CHARLES, who later became CHARLES VIII. Another son, FRANCIOUS, born two years later died in infancy. He made proper arrangements for his three surviving children's marriages, gave lands and titles to his illegitimate sons, arranged marriages for his illegitimate daughters. He, then, set about for three years ignoring CHARLOTTE by sending her to live in PARIS, while he brought into his CHATEAU, the young and beautiful daughter of COMTE D'MAILLY, CATHERINE, whom he kept with him until he suffered his last illness in 1477.

He suffered a stroke in the latter part of 1477. At that time, as he began decaying in mind and body, he imprisoned himself in his CHATEAU. Fearing assassination, suspicious of all, seeing no one save his eldest daughter, ANNE, and her husband PIERRE of BOURBON. A second stroke followed the first. Throughout FRANCE processions marched from shrine to shrine and saintly men were fetched from distant lands to pray for the KING, who dreaded death. Once he had been so meanly clad that people marveled and cried that his whole outfit, horse included, was not worth twenty FRANCS. Now he put out money on remedies, medicines and tonics. Courtiers whispered of a bath in young animals blood, and doctors went in fear of their lives until one JACQUES COETIER boldly faced him with hostility, forcing him to take proper care of himself, but it was too late. COETIER became rich and LOUIS became worse.

He dressed himself in robes whose magnificence contrasted with the poor garb of his early reign. Silks, velvets, pearls, jewels and braids adorned his thin, emancipated body. He became so gaunt and pale that those who saw him could hardly believe he was still alive. He suffered agonies with leg pains and hemroids and could not sit, stand nor walk. In 1483, on August 25, he suffered another stroke which deprived him of his speech. He died five days later on 30 Aug 1483. His QUEEN, CHARLOTTE, whom he had refused to see since he sent her away in 1475, died three months later in AMBOISE, LOIRE-ET-CHER, FRANCE.

FRANCIS BACON wrote of LOUIS XI as the "GREATEST MONARCH IN EUROPE, placing him with FERDINAND of CASTILE and HENRY VII of ENGLAND. The three being as the "THREE MAGI". THIS KING AND HIS GENERATION PAID FOR THE FUTURE PROSPERITY AND THE SPLENDOR OF FRANCE.

STORY TAKEN FROM:

ROYAL LINEAGE OF FRANCE STORY OF CIVILIZATION - WILL DURRANT LOUIS XI OF FRANCE by TYRRELL CHARLES d' VALOIS - PHILIP VI, KING - JOHN II, THE GOOD, KING - CHARLES VI, KING - CHARLES VI, THE MAD, KING - CHARLES VII, KING

CHARLES of VALOIS, was also COUNT of ANJOU, thru his marriage to MARGARET of ANJOU. He was the son of a KING, the father of a KING, the brother of a KING and had three Uncles who were KINGS, but was never a KING himself. He was, however, an exceptional MILITARY LEADER, having such a strong ARMY that POPE BONIFACE invited him to come to ITALY to pacify a great uprising. CHARLES completed this mission, then went on to SICILY where he met CATHERINE de COURTENAY, whom he later married in 1300, after his first wife MARGARET died in 1299. MARGARET gave him a son, PHILIP and two fine daughters. CATHERINE gave him only daughters, all of whom married TITLED GENTLEMEN. Therefore, young PHILIP was later to become KING of FRANCE.

The cousins of PHILIP VI - PHILIP V and CHARLES IV - were CAPETAIN KINGS with a direct line, but had left no heirs. When KING CHARLES IV died, his wife was expecting but the birth produced a daughter, therefore, there was no direct male heir to the THRONE. This brought an end to the CAPETAIN DYNASTY. COUNT CHARLES was of the VALOIS line and his son PHILIP, by rights, then became PHILIP VI, first KING of the VALOIS DYNASTY, a LINE which our PEDIGREE runs into earlier in HISTORY when ROLLO ROLF, DUKE of NORMANDY married POPA de SENLIS-VALOIS. PHILIP VI was prominent in the "HUNDRED YEAR WAR" and during his reign, the years of 1338 and 1339 brought the BLACK PLAGUE which ran rampant throughout EUROPE, taking his own beloved wife in its toll. Most of EUROPE stopped their fighting for a time because everyone seemed to be afflicted. More of the POOR than the RICH were its victims, however, it spared no one reaching the CASTLES as well as the SLUMS. PHILIP VI was so devastated from the scourge of the PLAGUE and the ultimate defeat of his ARMIES, that in Feb 1350 he married BLANCHE of NAVARRE daughter of PHILIP of EVREUX and JOAN of NAVARRE. She was born in 1332 and had been negotiated for earlier, in favor of his son JOHN. He died only seven months after his marriage.

JOHN II, son of PHILIP VI, was only 17 years of age when his father sent him on a mission to GERMANY to do battle. There he met the lovely BONNE of LUXEMBURG, who was only 14 years of age and a daughter of the KING of BOHEMIA. They fell in love and were married while he was still in GERMANY, despite their youth. He brought her back to FRANCE with him. She bore him five children, four sons and one daughter. However, her youthful, slight body was sorely overtaxed with these births, so close together and sought the solace of the grave. JOHN II was greatly saddened and leaving his five young children in the care of the COURT, spent almost his entire time taking himself and his armies on warring excursions and trying to put his Kingdom back on its feet. He was well loved by his subjects and they called him JOHN THE GOOD. His greatest dream was to bring PEACE with ENGLAND.

After the death of BONNE he had married JOAN of BOLOGNE on 9 Feb 1350, purely for POLITICAL reaso. She produced for him NO children. In May 1360, a PEACE TREATY was signed between FRANCE and ENGLAND. JOHN'S two sons, the DUKES of ANJOU and BERRY were sent to ENGLAND as HOSTAGES for the FRENCH FIDELITY to the treaty. JOHN II, who had spent two years in LONDON trying to bring about the TREATY returned to PARIS. However, when the DUKE of ANJOU broke parole and made his escape to join his wife JEANNE of ANJOU, KING JOHN II journied to LONDON to replace his son as a hostage and hoped to negotiate a milder PEACE TREATY. He remained in ENGLAND as EDWARD'S GUEST until 9 Apr 1365, when he fell ill and died. He was buried at ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL in LONDON, remaining a captive, even in DEATH.

CHARLES V d'VALOIS, KING, was called "THE WISE" because of his wise decisions in the affairs of state and because he could do battle without raising his hand. His right hand was perpetually swollen, and his arm was limp so that he could not lift it. He made battle commands vocally. His reign yielded a re-building of the government. In 1380, he declared WAR on ENGLAND and drove them from most of FRANCE. He married JEANNE of BOURBON on 8 Apr 1360. She gave him two daughters and a son, CHARLES - DAUPHINE. The KING died on 16 Apr 1380 at the CREST of VICTORY with ENGLAND.

CHARLES VI, THE MAD, was 12 years old when his father died. His Uncles, the husbands of his father's sisters, acted as REGENTS until he was twenty and allowed him to grow up in irresponsible debauchery. He took the reigns of government in 1388 and served well for four years. He married ISABELLE of BAVARIA on 17 Jul 1385. In 1392, however, due to the extreme pain he had been suffering with violent headaches, he became insane. For thirty years, the FRENCH THRONE was held by a pitiful imbicle. He could no longer recognize his wife. He begged her to stay away from him, but ISABELLE desired a larger family, so she continued her ministrations to him. He went for five months, at one time, without a a bath and finally ISABELLE had to summon six strong, husky men to hold him down while he was bathed. He would never change his clothing nor eat unless ISABELLE would force these tasks upon him. Only the humblest of servants paid any attention to him or his needs.

Their first son and heir to the THRONE, COUNT LOUIS, was born in 1390 and died in 1415, having been a very sickly child and unlikely to be named DAUPHINE. COUNT CHARLES, born 1391, died when he was but ten years old. COUNT JOHN, the next in line, was only 19 years of age when he was killed in a skirmish, unmarried, with a definite tendency to follow in his father's footsteps. Finally, in 1403 another boy was born and was named in honor of his Father and his elder brother and was given the title of DAUPHINE at birth. He did, eventually, grow up to inherit the THRONE. While he was growing up he was urged and educated by his mother and the KING'S MINISTERS in hope he would develop into a GOOD KING. While he was still young, he realized that his country was in PERIL. Over-run again by the ENGLISH, hunger besieged the people until a great dysentary plague terrorized the entire nation. WILL DURRANT, in his book, THE REFORMATION, gives a pitiful story about "LIFE AMONG THE RUINS OF FRANCE" which is much too long to be included here, but anyone wishing to read it, may find it there.


In 1422, the DAUPHINE proclaimed himself KING CHARLES VII. In her desolation, FRANCE, looked to him for help. However, this timid listless, heedless YOUTH of 20 years, was not what they needed. He had no stomach for WAR. He pawned his jewels and clothing to finance assistance to ENGLAND. He left the governing and warring to his MINISTERS. It was at this time that the FABLED JOAN d'ARC, came upon the FRENCH SCENE. Most everyone has read or heard about this event in HISTORY, but in case one wants to read a most interesting and beautiful story about this famous SAINT, it can be found in THE REFORMATION where WILL DURRANT paints an excellent word picture about this happening.

It was not until 1436 that CHARLES VII finally began to rule his country himself. His affair with AGNES SOREL, his Mistress, was the talk of FRANCE. However, YOLANDE, the mother of his wife, MARIE of ANJOU, urged that this Mistress be accepted by the COURT. YOLANDE realized early that AGNES had more influence over the KING than did his wife or his MINISTERS, save JACQUES C'OUER. Between them, they helped CHARLES VII re-instate FRANCE and her possessions.

Thus, the son of CHARLES VII, the immortal LOUIS XI, father of our first MAILLY-MABILLE ANCESTOR, inherited the FATE of the great country of FRANCE.

DESCENDANTS and HISTORIANS, have written HISTORIES and ARTICLES about this PROMINENT FAMILY. They have been both FACT and SUPPOSITION. They have been GOOD and BAD. However, it is the job of a COMPILER to try to weed our the out the SUPPOSITION and include as much FACT as possible. This is what your COMPILER has attempted to do. A little SUPPOSITION has gone back into this work as FACT, because it has been PROVEN. There have been many accounts, some totally IN-ACCURATE and others just as totally ACCURATE. Our DEFINITE ANCESTRY HAS BEEN PROVEN. Through an exhaustive period of RESEARCH, many many PRAYERS, and lots and lots of READING, our ANCESTRY, according to HISTORY is correct. We have now, WRITTEN, HISTORICAL FACTS. Each bit of information included in this COMPILATION has been verified by at least TWO SOURCES, or it has not been used. FAMILY GROUP SHEETS, have come, for the most part directly from the families involved. GROUP SHEETS of our PROVEN ANCESTRY have been taken from the HISTORICAL RECORDS and backed up with the L.D.S. -I.G.I. RECORDS. Unless HISTORY books are in error, these, too, are correct.

The TITLE "THE COPPER KETTLE", came about because, as the story goes, each RULING HOUSE in FRANCE, long before the time of SEIGNEUR PIERRE D'MAILLY, chose a SYMBOL for their family. THE FAMILY OF VALOIS, whose DYNASTY is the oldest one we have descended from. It began following the Invasion of GAUL by the LOMBARDS and the NORMANS. They had a simple GOLD CHAIN on which hung the AMULET where the COPPER KETTLE was embrossed. The FAMILY of MONTMORENCY who also came from the HOUSE OF VALOIS, adopted it as their FAMILY EMBLEM, thus it was carried down to the D'MAILLY FAMILY from there. Earlier in the time of KING HENRY I, he wore the AMULET, but the COPPER KETTLE hung from the mouth of the GRIFFIN. Later, however, it became a single AMULET, a duplicate of the ORIGINAL used by the HOUSE OF VALOIS. The COPPER KETTLE was embrossed upon a field of SAPPHIRE BLUE, surrounded by BLUE PEARLS.

Not too much is said of our SYMBOL as HISTORY progressed, excepting its mention as being work by the KING, HIS GENERALS and ADMIRALS, when they led their forces into battle. ADMIRAL COLIGNY wore his AMULET when his PORTRAIT was painted in 1564. It turned up in HOLLAND after our ancestor PIERRE fled there from FRANCE. It surfaced again in AMERICA, when it was found round the neck of an INDIAN that young PIETER killed during the REVOLUTIONARY WAR. (See Story) It is not known how the INDIAN got it, nor what happened to it today. It was duplicated for this book by enlarging the PORTRAIT of ADMIRAL COLIGNY and duplicating the intricate design, then coloring it.

### NOTES FROM YOUR COMPILER

I AM TRULY GREATFUL TO THE MANY RELATIVES WHO HAVE HELPED ME SO MUCH IN THE COMPILATION OF THIS BOOK.

FIRST: To my GRANDFATHER, PETER E. VAN ORDEN, who lived in LEWISTON, UTAH, who with his brother, WILLARD A. VAN ORDEN, began this work back in the early 1900's. In 1917, they visited the CATSKILLS, spending several months with the OVERBAUGH FAMILY and gathering data. They began letter writing long before then. I have several letters which bear the date of 1901. To my WONDERFUL FATHER, MERLIN T. VAN ORDEN and my brother, A. L. VAN ORDEN (both deceased) who gave me much help and encouragement. HOWEVER, I could not forget my GRAND-FATHER'S WISH, that "SOMEDAY ALL THIS INFORMATION COULD BE GATHERED TOGETHER AND PUT INTO ONE BOOK, SO THAT EVERY FAMILY MEMBER WOULD HAVE ACCESS TO IT AND KNOW WHO THEY WERE AND TO WHOM THEY WERE RELATED".

When I was very young, my Grandfather insisted that I help him with his records. I sputtered then, but now I am very thankful that he pressed me into service. I learned how to understand GENEALOGY and its PURPOSE, in a way that I could not otherwise have done. I came to know my ancestors and realize that they were not merely names, but people who had lived on this earth and experienced the same joys, sorrows and other emotions that we do today. It became a great CHALLANGE to me to find out more about them.

When I completed my Education for my B. S. Degree (Music and Speech), I decided to do my GRADUATE WORK in PROFESSIONAL RESEARCH, so that I might transfer these learnings to the field of FAMILY RESEARCH. By then, it had beome my HOBBY. To the CHARLES AUGUSTUS VAN ORDEN family of Mendham, N. J. for their records. To the BERTON ROGERS FAMILY of CATSKILL. N. Y. for their records. To AGATHA HATCH of LOGAN, UTAH, who not only sent me their family records, but much research she had personally done on families who intermarried with ours, to make our picture more complete.

A VERY SPECIAL, SPECIAL THANKS to RAY and BARBARA SMITH MARTEL and DON and JEAN SMITH DIXON, both of FLORIDA, for meeting me at the airport on BOSTON, on my return from EUROPE in July 1984 and taking me to the CATSKILLS to meet many other members of the family and experience the tremendous joy of standing where our ancestors stood, seeing their homes, their farms and partaiging of their spirit when we visited their final resting places. THIS WAS A WONDERFUL CONTRIBUTION, which I SHALL NEVER FORGET. A WONDERFUL FAMILY, I SALUTE YOU ALL. TO BARBARA and RAY also, for the many hours of RESEARCH they gave in getting me so much information I needed from the EAST.

#### LOUIS XI-KING OF FRANCE

The son of CHARLES VII, LOUIS was an exceptionally troublesome dauphine. Married against his will at thirteen (1436) to MARGARET of SCOTLAND, daughter of JAMES I and JANE BEAUFORT. MARGARET was born in SCOTLAND in 1424. LOUIS was born in 1423 in BOURGES, FRANCE. LOUIS avenged himself by ignoring MARGARET and cultivating MISTRESSES. MARGARET was a lonely princess, having lived a very secluded life in SCOTLAND, only to be married in FRANCE and be ignored by her husband. She loved poetry and began writing poems when she was left alone so much by LOUIS. KING CHARLES felt sorry for her and took her with him on one of his campaigns. There she caught a chill which developed into an illness from which she died in 1445 at CHALONS-SUR-MARNE, FRANCE.

LOUIS rebelled against his father and fled to FLANDERS, to wait, fretfully, until he could take over the KINGSHIP. CHARLES did accommodate his son, by starving himself to death in 1461.

LOUIS was a thin and ungainly character. Homely and meloncholy, with distrustful eyes and a far reaching mose. He looked like a peasant, dressed like an impoverished pilgrim in rough gray gown and a shabby felt hat. He was only 29 years of age when he plighted himself to six-year old CHARLOTTE of SAVOY. He married her six years later when she was 12 years old. She was such a child that when she bore her first child for him, the babe, a son, died in infancy. Her first living child was a girl, of which LOUIS took no notice. She later bore him two more daughters and two more sons, whose existance was scarcely noted by their father.

LOUIS scorned the POMP of FEUDALISM. He laughed at traditions and formalities, questioned his own legitimacy and shocked all THRONES with his simplicity. LOUIS had little time to spare, even for a wife as amiable and chaste as CHARLOTTE. His oppressions had stirred the great Vassals of the CROWNS, and driven them to form leagues against him and he found his country a mere collection of scattered provinces and himself scarcely more powerful than his own strongest Vassel. LOUIS lived in the gloomy PALACE of LES TOURNELLES in PARIS or in the CHATEAU of PLESSIS-LES-TOURS, a hunting lodge his father had kept, which he had re-done. He lived a bachelor-like existance, in spite of his devoted wife. His goal was for two things. (1) He wanted an HEIR, which he did not get until 1470 and (2) he wanted FRANCE'S UNIFICATION and RE-BIRTH. He kept only a few attendants, ate such food as any peasant might afford. He looked, not an iota, but would be, every inch, a KING. OUR ROYAL ANCESTOR.

He subordinated every element of character in his resolve that FRANCE should, under his hammer, be forged out of the FEUDAL FRAGMATION, into a MONARCHY with UNITY and MONOLITHIC STRENGTH, and, that this centralized MONARCHY should lift FRANCE out of the ashes of war, to a New LIFE AND POWER. He was unsuccessful in WAR and preferred DIPLOMACY, ESPIONAGE and BRIBERY to FORCE. He brought men around to his purposes by persuasion, flattery or fear and kept a large staff of spies in his service at home and abroad. He attended to details of the government and forgot nothing. He spared time for LITERATURE and ART, He READ avidly. He collected manuscripts, recognized the revolution that PRINTING presaged and enjoyed the company of educated men and beautiful women.

In his SELF-EXILE in FLANDERS, he had formed an ACADEMY of SCHOLARS, who salted their lives with jolly tales. He was hard on the rich, careless of the poor, hostile to the Artisan Guilds, favorable to the Middle-class, who were his strongest supporters. He was ruthless with any who opposed him, regardless of class. He visited the SACRED SHRINES, conscripted RELICS, bribed the SAINTS to his service and took the VIRGIN into partnership with himself in his WARS. With the help of his faults, he created a MODERN FRANCE. He made it a NATION, the most powerful in LATIN CHRISTIANDOM. He brought in SILK WEAVERS from ITALY, MINERS from GERMANY He improved harbors and transport. He protected FRENCH SHIPPING with a NAVY. He opened new markets to FRENCH INDUSTRY and allied the GOVERNMENT of FRANCE with the rising MERCANTILE and FINANCIAL BOURGEOISLE. FEUDALISM was no longer needed for the protection and management of AGRICULTURE. The peasantry was slowly freeing itself from the stagnant serfdom and the rights were restricted to trespass on other's property. He forbade the ESTATES to wage private wars and demanded of them all, back dues they had failed to pay.

He slipped into war with DUKE FRANCIS of BRITTANY, who had captured his father years before and took BRITTANY away from him. He made a friend of CHARLES, DUKE OF BURGANDY and went to fight with him. He fought the BARONS and subdued them. He accomplished for FRANCE that NATIONAL UNIFICATION and CENTRALIZED ADMINISTRATION which he so wanted.

In 1470, his wife finally gave him an HEIR, CHARLES, who later became CHARLES VIII. Another son, FRANCIOUS, born two years later died in infancy. He made proper arrangements for his three surviving children's marriages, gave lands and titles to his illegitimate sons, arranged marriages for his illegitimate daughters. He, then, set about for three years ignoring CHARLOTTE by sending her to live in PARIS, while he brought into his CHATEAU, the young and beautiful daughter of COMTE D'MAILLY, CATHERINE, whom he kept with him until he suffered his last illness in 1477.

He suffered a stroke in the latter part of 1477. At that time, as he began decaying in mind and body, he imprisoned himself in his CHATEAU. Fearing assassination, suspicious of all, seeing no one save his eldest daughter, ANNE, and her husband PIERRE of BOURBON. A second stroke followed the first. Throughout FRANCE processions marched from shrine to shrine and saintly men were fetched from distant lands to pray for the KING, who dreaded death. Once he had been so meanly clad that people marveled and cried that his whole outfit, horse included, was not worth twenty FRANCS. Now he put out money on remedies, medicines and tonics. Courtiers whispered of a bath in young animals blood, and doctors went in fear of their lives until one JACQUES COETIER boldly faced him with hostility, forcing him to take proper care of himself, but it was too late. COETIER became rich and LOUIS became worse.

He dressed himself in robes whose magnificence contrasted with the poor garb of his early reign. Silks, velvets, pearls, jewels and braids adorned his thin, emancipated body. He became so gaunt and pale that those who saw him could hardly believe he was still alive. He suffered agonies with leg pains and hemroids and could not sit, stand nor walk. In 1483, on August 25, he suffered another stroke which deprived him of his speech. He died five days later on 30 Aug 1483. His QUEEN, CHARLOTTE, whom he had refused to see since he sent her away in 1475, died three months later in AMBOISE, LOIRE-ET-CHER, FRANCE.

FRANCIS BACON wrote of LOUIS XI as the "GREATEST MONARCH IN EUROPE, placing him with FERDINAND of CASTILE and HENRY VII of ENGLAND. The three being as the "THREE MAGI". THIS KING AND HIS GENERATION PAID FOR THE FUTURE PROSPERITY AND THE SPLENDOR OF FRANCE.

STORY TAKEN FROM:

ROYAL LINEAGE OF FRANCE STORY OF CIVILIZATION - WILL DURRANT LOUIS XI OF FRANCE by TYRRELL CHARLES V d'VALOIS, KING, was called "THE WISE" because of his wise decisions in the affairs of state and because he could do battle without raising his hand. His right hand was perpetually swollen, and his arm was limp so that he could not lift it. He made battle commands vocally. His reign yielded a re-building of the government. In 1380, he declared WAR on ENGLAND and drove them from most of FRANCE. He married JEANNE of BOURBON on 8 Apr 1360. She gave him two daughters and a son, CHARLES - DAUPHINE. The KING died on 16 Apr 1380 at the CREST of VICTORY with ENGLAND.

CHARLES VI, THE MAD, was 12 years old when his father died. His Uncles, the husbands of his father's sisters, acted as REGENTS until he was twenty and allowed him to grow up in irresponsible debauchery. He took the reigns of government in 1388 and served well for four years. He married ISABELLE of BAVARIA on 17 Jul 1385. In 1392, however, due to the extreme pain he had been suffering with violent headaches, he became insane. For thirty years, the FRENCH THRONE was held by a pitiful imbicle. He could no longer recognize his wife. He begged her to stay away from him, but ISABELLE desired a larger family, so she continued her ministrations to him. He went for five months, at one time, without a a bath and finally ISABELLE had to summon six strong, husky men to hold him down while he was bathed. He would never change his clothing nor eat unless ISABELLE would force these tasks upon him. Only the humblest of servants paid any attention to him or his needs.

Their first son and heir to the THRONE, COUNT LOUIS, was born in 1390 and died in 1415, having been a very sickly child and unlikely to be named DAUPHINE. COUNT CHARLES, born 1391, died when he was but ten years old. COUNT JOHN, the next in line, was only 19 years of age when he was killed in a skirmish, unmarried, with a definite tendency to follow in his father's footsteps. Finally, in 1403 another boy was born and was named in honor of his Father and his elder brother and was given the title of DAUPHINE at birth. He did, eventually, grow up to inherit the THRONE. While he was growing up he was urged and educated by his mother and the KING'S MINISTERS in hope he would develop into a GOOD KING. While he was still young, he realized that his country was in PERIL. Over-run again by the ENGLISH, hunger besieged the people until a great dysentary plague terrorized the entire nation. WILL DURRANT, in his book, THE REFORMATION, gives a pitiful story about "LIFE AMONG THE RUINS OF FRANCE" which is much too long to be included here, but anyone wishing to read it, may find it there.

In 1422, the DAUPHINE proclaimed himself KING CHARLES VII. In her desolation, FRANCE, looked to him for help. However, this timid listless, heedless YOUTH of 20 years, was not what they needed. He had no stomach for WAR. He pawned his jewels and clothing to finance assistance to ENGLAND. He left the governing and warring to his MINISTERS. It was at this time that the FABLED JOAN d'ARC, came upon the FRENCH SCENE. Most everyone has read or heard about this event in HISTORY, but in case one wants to read a most interesting and beautiful story about this famous SAINT, it can be found in THE REFORMATION where WILL DURRANT paints an excellent word picture about this happening.

It was not until 1436 that CHARLES VII finally began to rule his country himself. His affair with AGNES SOREL, his Mistress, was the talk of FRANCE. However, YOLANDE, the mother of his wife, MARIE of ANJOU, urged that this Mistress be accepted by the COURT. YOLANDE realized early that AGNES had more influence over the KING than did his wife or his MINISTERS, save JACQUES C'OUER. Between them, they helped CHARLES VII re-instate FRANCE and her possessions.

Thus, the son of CHARLES VII, the immortal LOUIS XI, father of our first MAILLY-MABILLE ANCESTOR, inherited the FATE of the great country of FRANCE.

CHARLES d' VALOIS - PHILIP VI, KING - JOHN II, THE GOOD, KING - CHARLES VI, KING - CHARLES VI, THE MAD, KING - CHARLES VII, KING


CHARLES of VALOIS, was also COUNT of ANJOU, thru his marriage to MARGARET of ANJOU. He was the son of a KING, the father of a KING, the brother of a KING and had three Uncles who were KINGS, but was never a KING himself. He was, however, an exceptional MILITARY LEADER, having such a strong ARMY that POPE BONIFACE invited him to come to ITALY to pacify a great uprising. CHARLES completed this mission, then went on to SICILY where he met CATHERINE de COURTENAY, whom he later married in 1300, after his first wife MARGARET died in 1299. MARGARET gave him a son, PHILIP and two fine daughters. CATHERINE gave him only daughters, all of whom married TITLED GENTLEMEN. Therefore, young PHILIP was later to become KING of FRANCE.

The cousins of PHILIP VI - PHILIP V and CHARLES IV - were CAPETAIN KINGS with a direct line, but had left no heirs. When KING CHARLES IV died, his wife was expecting but the birth produced a daughter, therefore, there was no direct male heir to the THRONE. This brought an end to the CAPETAIN DYNASTY. COUNT CHARLES was of the VALOIS line and his son PHILIP, by rights, then became PHILIP VI, first KING of the VALOIS DYNASTY, a LINE which our PEDIGREE runs into earlier in HISTORY when ROLLO ROLF, DUKE of NORMANDY married POPA de SENLIS-VALOIS. PHILIP VI was prominent in the "HUNDRED YEAR WAR" and during his reign, the years of 1338 and 1339 brought the BLACK PLAGUE which ran rampant throughout EUROPE, taking his own beloved wife in its toll. Most of EUROPE stopped their fighting for a time because everyone seemed to be afflicted. More of the POOR than the RICH were its victims, however, it spared no one reaching the CASTLES as well as the SLUMS. PHILIP VI was so devastated from the scourge of the PLAGUE and the ultimate defeat of his ARMIES, that in Feb 1350 he married BLANCHE of NAVARRE daughter of PHILIP of EVREUX and JOAN of NAVARRE. She was born in 1332 and had been negotiated for earlier, in favor of his son JOHN. He died only seven months after his marriage.

JOHN II, son of PHILIP VI, was only 17 years of age when his father sent him on a mission to GERMANY to do battle. There he met the lovely BONNE of LUXEMBURG, who was only 14 years of age and a daughter of the KING of BOHEMIA. They fell in love and were married while he was still in GERMANY, despite their youth. He brought her back to FRANCE with him. She bore him five children, four sons and one daughter. However, her youthful, slight body was sorely overtaxed with these births, so close together and sought the solace of the grave. JOHN II was greatly saddened and leaving his five young children in the care of the COURT, spent almost his entire time taking himself and his armies on warring excursions and trying to put his Kingdom back on its feet. He was well loved by his subjects and they called him JOHN THE GOOD. His greatest dream was to bring PEACE with ENGLAND.

After the death of BONNE he had married JOAN of BOLOGNE on 9 Feb 1350, purely for POLITICAL reaso. She produced for him NO children. In May 1360, a PEACE TREATY was signed between FRANCE and ENGLAND. JOHN'S two sons, the DUKES of ANJOU and BERRY were sent to ENGLAND as HOSTAGES for the FRENCH FIDELITY to the treaty. JOHN II, who had spent two years in LUNDON trying to bring about the TREATY returned to PARIS. However, when the DUKE of ANJOU broke parole and made his escape to join his wife JEANNE of ANJOU, KING JOHN II journied to LONDON to replace his son as a hostage and hoped to negotiate a milder PEACE TREATY. He remained in ENGLAND as EDWARD'S GUEST until 9 Apr 1365, when he fell ill and died. He was buried at ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL in LONDON, remaining a captive, even in DEATH.

## SARGAENT GASPARD MABILLE

GASPARD MABILLE was born GASPARD D'MAILLY, son of SEIGNEUR PIERRE D'MAILLY of NEUVY-SUR-LOIRE, NIEVRE, FRANCE and ANTIONETTE D'DUMOND of NOYANT, MAINE-ET-LOIRE, ANJOU, FRANCE. He was born, however, in NAARDEN, HOLLAND, two years after his parents had fled FRANCE, due to RELIGIOUS PERSECUTION and his father changed his SURNAME to MABILLE. His birthday was in Aug 1575. The story of his parents exodus from FRANCE is given in PIERRE's history.

Not much is heard of GASPARD while he was growing up. His name became CASPER, which was the DUTCH way of spelling. He joined the DUTCH ROYAL NAVAL FORCES while still young and from this position he gained the TITLE of SARGAENT CASPER. He married a young FRENCH GIRL, whose family had also fled FRANCE near the time his parents did. She was SARRENTJE (SARAH) COYNE DU BOIS. Her mother was RENEE COYNE and her father was JACQUES DU BOIS. The DU BOIS FAMILY as well as the family of his mother, DUMOND, figures prominently in later years intermarrying with the VAN ORDEN FAMILY.

SARGAENT CASPER and his family remained in HOLLAND. The children's Birth and Marriage records are in AMSTERDAM. However, on THREE occasions, of which we have record, mentions his visits to AMERICA.

- (1) In 1650, he was witness to a BAPTISMAL. Entry at the DUTCH REFORMED CHURCH in NEW AMSTERDAM, he assisted his son, PIETERESE CASPERSZEN.
- (2) On 6 Nov 1651, he was chief witness of the BAPTISM of his GRAND-SON, naming him "CASPER DE SARGAENT". The entry states, "SARGAENT CASPER, attached to the DUTCH ROYAL NAVY". On that date also, he assisted his son, PIETERESE CASPERSZEN in witnessing the BAPTISM of JORIS, son of JORIS HOMER, a friend.
- (3) On 12 Feb 1652, he brought suit against JAN PEEK of PEEKSKILL, NEW YORK.

Since nothing more is recorded of SARGAENT CASPER in AMERICAN RECORDS, after that time, it can be safely assumed that he returned to HOLLAND and lived with his family. For records of his children see GROUP SHEET.

DESCENDANTS and HISTORIANS, have written HISTORIES and ARTICLES about this PROMINENT FAMILY. They have been both FACT and SUPPOSITION. They have been GOOD and BAD. A little SUPPOSITION has gone back into this work as FACT, because it has been PROVEN. There have been many accounts, some totally IN-ACCURATE and others just as totally ACCURATE. Our DEFINITE ANCESTRY HAS BEEN PROVEN. Through an exhaustive period of RESEARCH, many many PRAYERS, and lots and lots of READING, our ANCESTRY, according to HISTORY is correct. We have now, WRITTEN, HISTORICAL FACTS. Each bit of information included in this COMPILATION has been verified by at least TWO SOURCES, or it has not been used. FAMILY GROUP SHEETS, have come, for the most part directly from the families involved. GROUP SHEETS of our PROVEN ANCESTRY have been taken from the HISTORICAL RECORDS and backed up with the L.D.S. -I.G.I. RECORDS. Unless HISTORY books are in error, these, too, are correct.

The TITLE "THE COPPER KETTLE", came about because, as the story goes, each RULING HOUSE in FRANCE, long before the time of SEIGNEUR PIERRE D'MAILLY, chose a SYMBOL for their family. THE FAMILY OF VALOIS, whose DYNASTY is the oldest one we have descended from. It began following the Invasion of GAUL by the LOMBARDS and the NORMANS. They had a simple GOLD CHAIN on which hung the AMULET where the COPPER KETTLE was embrossed. The FAMILY of MONTMORENCY who also came from the HOUSE OF VALOIS, adopted it as their FAMILY EMBLEM, thus it was carried down to the D'MAILLY FAMILY from there. Earlier in the time of KING HENRY I, he wore the AMULET, but the COPPER KETTLE hung from the mouth of the GRIFFIN. Later, however, it became a single AMULET, a duplicate of the ORIGINAL used by the HOUSE OF VALOIS. The COPPER KETTLE was embrossed upon a field of SAPPHIRE BLUE, surrounded by BLUE PEARLS.

Not too much is said of our SYMBOL as HISTORY progressed, excepting its mention as being work by the KING, HIS GENERALS and ADMIRALS, when they led their forces into battle. ADMIRAL COLIGNY wore his AMULET when his PORTRAIT was painted in 1564. It turned up in HOLLAND after our ancestor PIERRE fled there from FRANCE. It surfaced again in AMERICA, when it was found round the neck of an INDIAN that young PIETER killed during the REVOLUTIONARY WAR. (See Story) It is not known how the INDIAN got it, nor what happened to it today. It was duplicated for this book by enlarging the PORTRAIT of ADMIRAL COLIGNY and duplicating the intricate design, then coloring it.
